2	for the salute to the flag?
3	(Pledge of Allegiance recited at this time.)
4	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Let me just I
5	would like to advise those present that notice of
6	this regular meeting of the Housing Authority of the
7	City of Hoboken has been provided to the public in
8	accordance with the provisions of the Open Public
9	Meetings Act. Notice of this meeting, Thursday,
10	November 9th, was given by publication of the annual
11	meeting notice of the Authority with amendments as
12	necessary, was sent to the Jersey Journal and Star
13	Ledger on Tuesday, October 31, 2023. It was sent to

24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Roll call.
25	Anthony Forbes?

2	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Present.
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Aaron Lewit?
4	COMMISSIONER LEWIT: Here.
5	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Barbara
6	Reyes?
7	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Here.
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Michael
9	Russo?
10	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Present.
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: James
12	Sanford?
13	Erica Seitzman?
14	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Present.
15	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: So we're going to be
16	in our public portion. As you guys know, you have
17	five minutes during public portion. I just ask that
18	everybody please be respectful, not only to the
19	Commissioners, to the staff and the director. And
20	as you may notice, the court clerk is not here in
21	person, she's online, so she has asked me to ask you
22	to all please spell your first and last name when
23	you come up to the microphone.
24	Mr. James Ladson? Ladson? Is he not
2.5	here?

1	Adelaida Torres?
2	THE WITNESS: Adelaida Torres.
3	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Adelaida Torres.
4	Terry, do you need me to spell it for you?
5	COURT STENOGRAPHER: Please, if you
6	could give me the spelling.
7	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Sure. It's
8	A-D-E-L-A-I-D-A, Torres, T-O-R-R-E-S.
9	COURT STENOGRAPHER: And if she could
10	just speak directly into the microphone, I'd
11	appreciate it. Thank you.
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Frank, do you want
13	to help her with the translation?
14	COURT STENOGRAPHER: Frank, you speak
15	into the microphone then.
16	MR. MERCHAND: Okay. She is here. Her
17	car was towed, she's explaining to us that she has
18	all her paperwork for the car to be registered, and
19	that her car was towed. She's sick, she hasn't been
20	able to take her car out, she had a procedure, I
21	believe, at the time. And her car is still in the
22	pound as of right now.
23	(Commissioner Sanford enters the proceedings
24	at 7:05 p.m.)
25	VOICE: But they took it on the 30th.

1	MR. MERCHAND: The 30th.
2	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Is there something
3	you would like to say?
4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, well,
5	you know, we've had our ads out for registering your
6	car for over a month.
7	VOICE: Until the 31st.
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah.
9	MR. MERCHAND: You know, I don't I
10	know we don't have back and forth, so I don't know
11	if we're
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah.
13	MR. MERCHAND: I happen to know
14	information
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Go ahead.
16	Terry's going to ask us.
17	MR. MERCHAND: Her car was parked
18	that car was sitting there for over 30 days. That
19	morning we towed four cars from that lot, not her
20	car, we towed four cars, they had not when we
21	looked at the cameras, cars who had not moved
22	whether we weren't looking to see if you were
23	registered, we were looking to see if the car had
24	moved. So these vehicles had on top of it were
25	not registered.

1	I know that you said that you're
2	registered, but you don't have the new sticker,
3	right? You have the new sticker, the green one?
4	VOICE: No.
5	MR. MERCHAND: All right. You have the
6	old one. So she did not come to register her
7	vehicle yet, and I'll walk you through that and we
8	should register your vehicle. But her car was towed
9	not because of registration, it was because it had
10	not moved for more than 30 days. She did come to
11	the office to ask me if she could if she could
12	speak with the director. I did speak with the
13	director, and after the director heard that we towed
14	four other cars, the decision was made that
15	unfortunately we were not going to because if

understand.

But when you said to me, when you came.

VOICE: She was trying to explain it to
you, right, she's trying to tell you that the car -the papers that they put for us, it stated that you
had until the 31st --

either you pay for the car to get it back or we pay

for the car to get it back. And unfortunately the

cars that were towed, that's how -- so I do

MR. MERCHAND: Margie, let her --

1	voice: No, she don't know how to
2	explain it to you.
3	MR. MERCHAND: But I know exactly what
4	happened with her, and it has nothing to do with her
5	registration.
6	VOICE: Did you not explain it to them
7	that they took it on the 30th, not on the 31st.
8	MR. MERCHAND: No no no.
9	VOICE: On the 30th.
10	MR. MERCHAND: But it wasn't towed
11	because of registration, it was towed because the
12	car had not moved for more than 30 days.
13	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: So let me ask a
14	question. So what is the
15	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
16	MR. MERCHAND: Two weeks for a
17	registered car.
18	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: No no, I
19	understand. What is the process of her getting the
20	car back? What is the cost of that? What's the
21	next steps for her so we understand what she has to
22	do?
23	MR. MERCHAND: And I can certainly
24	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Help if we can.
25	MR. MERCHAND: I can certainly speak

1	with our tow company and, you know, if we are agreed
2	upon, maybe there could be something that she could
3	get a discounted price to let the car out. But at
4	the even at the day that she was there, it would
5	have been one day's worth. Obviously, I know that
6	she made the choice to wait for a decision, which is
7	what's made the clock run, right? And more.
8	But yes, at this point we could still
9	talk to Lopez, we can make a decision. But at this
10	point there's a dollar amount that has to be
11	satisfied to release the car.
12	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So her car was
13	towed because of a policy that the Housing Authority
14	has that if it's left there for more than two weeks
15	and you don't move it, it has to be moved.
16	MR. MERCHAND: So
17	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: It has to be
18	towed.
19	MR. MERCHAND: So as you know
20	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: It has
21	nothing now, this just happened to happen at the
22	time when you guys were recertifying the
23	registrations for the new year.
24	MR. MERCHAND: So and exactly,

because we were about to --

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: It had nothing
2	to do with the registration.
3	MR. MERCHAND: Right.
4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And where is
5	that, is that in their
6	MR. MERCHAND: Parking policy of
7	that's part of the lease.
8	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Part of the
9	lease.
10	MR. MERCHAND: Yes. So if she had a
11	registered vehicle from last year, which she says
12	she has a registered vehicle and I believe she does,
13	part of that package is her parking regulations, and
14	one of them is the car must move, you can't leave a
15	car in a spot.
16	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: When is the
17	last time that you towed a car
18	MR. MERCHAND: No, so because we just
19	did the reregistration of everybody, we had not been
20	towing inside the lots. The only place we ever
21	towed for the last year and a half has been the
22	yellow. We went through the registration process,
23	which took over a month of, like, you know,
2 4	announcing, Nixles, door to door, and they were
25	supposed to so now on the very last day, what we

1	wanted to do is look at all the cars that had been
2	sitting there, and we towed a lot of cars that had
3	just been sitting there, she just happens to be the
4	only car of all the cars that we towed that came to
5	the office to complain because of a real thing. I'm
6	not saying that you didn't have a real thing. She
7	had a medical situation, which she had not informed
8	to us, right? So had we known that, we may have
9	been able to say, listen, she told us that she's in
10	the hospital, we couldn't do that right? So.
11	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Okay. So
12	let's get to a let's get to a resolution.
13	MR. MERCHAND: Yes, yes.
14	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So what is
15	normally a tow? How much is normally the tow from
16	the lot?
17	MR. MERCHAND: I think it's 250 per
18	day.
19	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Not the
20	storage, the tow.
21	MR. MERCHAND: No.
22	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
23	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: The tow has got be
2 4	one fee and then the storage per day is probably a
25	different fee.

Ι	MR. MERCHAND: I don't have that
2	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So let's find
3	that out
4	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
5	MR. KOTHERITHARA: Counsel, I can
6	answer that, that it is \$200 for the tow, and it's
7	\$50 per day.
8	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Okay. So let's
9	see if we as an Authority could have a conversation
10	with our vendor to help on the storage fee for the
11	daily stuff and then maybe figure out how we could
12	get how we could help on the tow.
13	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: The only
14	problem is is that how many cars got towed?
15	MR. MERCHAND: That day, at least four.
16	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: If you do it
17	for her, you're going to have to do it for all.
18	She's the only one that complained, so
19	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: She's the only one
20	that was registered, had a registered vehicle, which
21	is she said her car was only parked there the
22	car that was parked next to her had been parked
23	there for over two years.
24	VOICE: Two years.
25	MR. MERCHAND: I agree that the cars

1	next to her were parked for a long time. She was
2	parked there for a month. And I do
3	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: They both got
4	towed.
5	MR. MERCHAND: They both got towed.
6	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Well, let's do
7	this. We have the information, why don't we figure
8	this out offline so that we can continue with the
9	meeting, and then kind of take it from there.
10	Director?
11	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Yes.
12	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Do you think
13	that that would be problematic for us to have that
1 4	conversation with the
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: No, not at
16	all. In fact, Frank suggested it, and I think we
17	should do that early next week, Monday, Tuesday,
18	we'll have that conversation with the towing
19	company, see what we can what kind of discount we
20	do get and see what we can do for her.
21	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I would like that.
22	THE COURT: Anything else?
23	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
2 4	MR. MERCHAND: So it's not a promise,
2.5	it's a conversation

1	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Yeah, right.
2	Understood.
3	MR. MERCHAND: But we're going to
4	continue the conversation, and we're going to talk
5	with you, we're going to talk with the director,
6	we're going to talk with the tow company.
7	VOICE: (In Spanish.)
8	MR. MERCHAND: No no, I took your
9	information, and I gave it I did give it to the
10	director.
11	Director, I asked you about this
12	specifically.
13	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes.
14	MR. MERCHAND: I brought it to the
15	director.
16	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes.
17	MR. MERCHAND: I didn't ignore you so.
18	VOICE: (In Spanish.)
19	MR. MERCHAND: Señora
20	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
21	MR. MERCHAND: So what she's talking
22	about is what she's talking about is paperwork
23	that she was showing me that day that she had had a
24	procedure, there was never a conversation that I
25	can't get to doctors' appointments, because we would

1	have figured out either through HOPES or through the
2	police a way to get that conversation was never
3	had. You did tell me that you had a procedure, that
4	that's why the car had been there. So.
5	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Yeah. And, again,
6	I don't want to seem like I'm trying to cut you off,
7	I just don't want to I don't want you to air out
8	your medical stuff here.
9	MR. MERCHAND: Right.
10	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: It's not the
11	appropriate place, I think having the conversation
12	offline is a little bit better, and let's see if we
13	can come up with a solution for that.
14	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Okay?
15	MR. MERCHAND: And I would like this to
16	be clear, that Frank did bring it to me, we did talk
17	it over, and because her car was just like the other
18	cars that are parked there, we decided not to move
19	on it. But with her coming, we'll reevaluate when
20	you come in.
21	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Can you just
22	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Just have
23	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
24	MR. MERCHAND: She has one more
25	complaint. So she's complaining about in her

bathroom, she says she has mold in the tub. I asked 1 2 her if she had spoken with her manager, she said she 3 did. So I'll follow-up to see where that is. 4 And she's talking about her stove as 5 well. She said about six months ago she got 6 approval to have a stove replaced, but she hasn't 7 had it yet. So what I'm going to do, I have her information, we're going to follow up on the 8 9 bathroom and maintenance come on Monday. Okay. 10 COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Thank you. 11 CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you. 12 COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Director, can 13 you just go through the parking policy, I'm confused 14 by that. 15 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Well, I 16 don't think I brought it in front of me today, but 17 we get -- just as background, we get many complaints from other residents that people are parked there so 18 19 they can't find a spot in when they come. 20 COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Right. 21 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: So, you 22 know, we do have a registration drive this month 23 that's in our parking lot, you've got to come in and give us your information on your car, it's allowed 24 25 to have one car per unit, per apartment. You got to

1	come in, it's got to be registered to you for the
2	person that's there. So you come in, you register
3	it, we've got a sticker that goes on the back of
4	your car, on the back of your rear-view mirror, and
5	there's a number of other things "such as" in that
6	policy, we'll be glad to distribute it this week,
7	but a number of other things in there like you can't
8	leave it, you can't work on your car in our parking
9	lots, you can't just have it out on blocks, that
10	type of thing is addressed in the parking policy.
11	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Now, the
12	policy is 14 days not moved it gets towed?
13	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah.
1 4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And how is
15	that is there a notice put on the door, the
16	window?
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: No, we
18	normally just go and get it.
19	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: You just go
20	and it says that in the policy?
21	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, I
22	don't know if it says that at 14 days we won't give
23	you a notice, I don't know if it says that.
2 4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So we don't
25	contact the person and say, hey, your car is

1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: No, we do
2	not. No, we do not because we often don't know
3	whose car it is. But we just
4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Well, if it's
5	registered we do.
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah. But
7	if it's parked illegally, we tow it. And that's the
8	same on the streets on all those yellow lines.
9	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: We don't
11	contact the person before we tow it. And that
12	parking policy does have you can't park on the
13	yellow lines.
14	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I guess the
15	one thing we could do just to help is the ones that
16	are registered
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Uh-huh.
18	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: that we
19	have their information
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Uh-huh.
21	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: is give
22	them we give them one courtesy call or contact.
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, or a
24	sticker.
25	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Or the city does,

1	they could do a courtesy call.
2	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, or a
3	sticker.
4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I mean, on the
5	city you got to move it, you got to move it every
6	week for street cleaning. I don't want to get into
7	that but
8	THE COURT: Yeah.
9	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: \$6 million
10	a year that they collect.
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Because I
12	didn't know the city called before they towed a car.
13	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: For temporary
14	no parking signs they will give a call.
15	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: A courtesy call.
16	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And if you
17	don't move it then they tow it.
18	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: They give you a
19	reasonable amount of time, I mean you're not waiting
20	an hour for you to move your car.
21	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So if we
22	can
23	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
24	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: That would be
25	a nice touch you know. Just

MR. MERCHAND: If I may, that was one of the goals of the reregistration because we had -Like, you were registered, right, you had the red one, right?

Her license plate, her registration is a book in the manager's office, that's how we used to have it, right? Part of the new registration is now I'll have everyone's license, insurance, registration, plates, in the system, so when the police call me or there's an issue, I can actually look that plate up if you're a registered person, and yes, now I'll have the information. So that was — that was part of the grab of the reregistration.

especially with cars, not for regular tows, but for cars who have not moved, because the only way that we confirm this, we just go look at the camera, we look at the camera, you return, one, two, three, four, five, six, seven days, nobody is not there, we'll be able to say, okay, that car didn't move, if it's a registered vehicle that's in our system now, because now registration is complete, we'll be able to call that person and say, hey, listen, I'm going to tow the car tomorrow if you don't move it. Then

1	that gives them you can move it to the next spot,
2	that's not even the point, we just need cars to
3	move. They can't stay. If you have a registered
4	car, you can't just leave it as storage, you can't.
5	So many people but I just wanted to kind of let
6	you know.
7	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes, we
8	will, that's we will do that.
9	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Thank you.
10	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Margie Biart.
11	MS. BIART: Margie Biart.
12	COURT STENOGRAPHER: Could you spell
13	your name, please?
14	MS. BIART: M-A-R well, I'll give
15	you my full name.
16	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Margie, I'm sorry,
17	turn the microphone towards you. Sorry.
18	MS. BIART: M-A-R-C-E-L-I-N-A,
19	B-I-A-R-T.
20	Should I speak?
21	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes.
22	MS. BIART: Okay. I came here to
23	complain in reference to the elevator. We're having
24	so much problems with this elevator. These guys are
25	coming over, charging you money, and then no sooner

1	do they leave, the elevator is out. We get stuck.
2	I have phobias, I don't feel like being stuck inside
3	an elevator. I would appreciate it if somebody gets
4	this done right, because we all old people, there's
5	a lot of all of us in this building and we scared to
6	get into the elevator because the door, the first
7	door, the front door goes this way and the other one
8	stays that way, so, you know, we're scared that it
9	might fall down. You know, we want somebody to do
10	something about this.
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: My
12	understanding he was here this afternoon.
13	MS. BIART: Yes, and he was also here
14	yesterday and then hours later the elevator was out
15	of order.
16	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: But he left
17	at five today so. It's a machine.
18	MS. BIART: Okay. But okay, so you
19	have it fixed, so get it fixed, if it messes up,
20	well, then, you know what, change the people that
21	are working, they're not doing their job.
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Please feel
23	free
24	MS. BIART: And I know there's a lot of
25	us that hold the door because I'm not going to blame

it all on the elevator, you know, there's a lot of us that hold the door, and we keep forgetting that there are other people in the building that need to use the elevator. You can't hold it for nobody.

Okay. Now I'm finished.

Now, you say that the policy is two weeks about the parking? You had a car parked here for four years, four years without being registered, and we kept on complaining, I kept on complaining, a lot of people kept on complaining. Four years in that parking lot. They took that car out this year because the people came back from Puerto Rico. So that's not a policy of two years, of two weeks, and when she parked her car, the reason why she parked it there, because it was flooded with water. She doesn't explain it because she gets nervous, but I knew the whole story.

And I will say what I have to say for anybody that I have to stand up here because you know what? This is our home, and if we can't protect each other, we don't need your help then. You understand? And this is what she's going through all of this, so the policy of the two weeks, that's bull. That is bull. Because the car that was in front of her was there for two years. Where

is the policy then? Where's the two-week policy, okay? Where is the two-week? Four years here and everybody could get -- because they know it in the office, we complain, why is that car there for four years and hasn't been moved at all? They didn't move it at all. Nobody even came to take off the dust. You understand?

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And it's not fair, because right now she's a sick person, and you going -- yous going to come with the story that you got two weeks, a two-week policy, that's bull crap. You can say that to somebody that doesn't know the rules here, but that's bull crap. When you have a car for four years and two years, tell me where's the two weeks. Where's the two weeks? Because the minute that we register our car, you have my insurance, you have my driver's license, you have where I live, and you also have my numbers, I always give both numbers, both numbers, so you can get in contact with me, because I don't know, I'm the one that's having problem every time I'm parking my car, somebody's always in my parking space. I am so sweet, and everybody here could tell you, that every time I move my car -- the other day I was calling, and they want to send a tow truck, what happened? Before the

1	tow truck came, the car moved.
2	But I have to go through this all the
3	time. And I've been asking for them to give us
4	something where we can call directly instead of
5	waiting for somebody to call for us. If we have
6	something, we show them this is my space, and this
7	car is constantly, this is from across the street
8	and from the building next door. This is
9	everybody could tell you, my car is so my space
10	is so sweet, okay? Come on, and if you're going to
11	say something here that is on paper, say the truth,
12	don't come up with these bull.
13	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you, Margie.
14	Ray Rodriguez.
15	MR. RODRIGUEZ: I'm ready.
16	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. Just say and
17	spell your name for the Court Reporter.
18	MR. RODRIGUEZ: Ray Rodriguez. R-A-Y,
19	R-O-D-R-I-G-U-E-Z. Am I good to go?
20	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes.
21	MR. RODRIGUEZ: All right. So I'm
22	standing up here with immense pride and I would like
23	to thank all the Board Members. Right now we just
24	launched our sixth Unleash Your Inner Warrior
25	women's self defense workshop that was very

1	successful, we sold out, we went on Eventbrite. We
2	had a lot of women come out and take the class.
3	They did extremely well. Some of the women got
4	offended because I was pretty tough on them, and I
5	don't know how it was supposed to be done but I
6	guess tough is supposed to be how it's supposed to
7	be taught. But they enjoyed it, most of them did,
8	and we had a successful class.

This 28th of November we will have our first ever -- we're going to be in the tree lighting event where two of my kids in the guitar class are going to be performing, so great, great job, I guess, I'm doing.

We also are going to be doing a lot more in the future. I enjoyed myself at the Trunk or Treat, Erica was there, I had a great time, my trunk was really full of candy, and the kids took more than a handful, which I didn't mind.

In the future, I look forward to recognizing a lot of you guys for having me here, I'm now 14 years this October.

October 3rd we launched homework help, that has been going extremely well. We're getting a lot of volunteers to help the kids with their homework. We're getting a lot of kids to come in

and do homework, which I'm very proud of.

So soon I'll be acknowledging everyone here at the Hoboken Housing Authority. You guys, I'm so grateful for your support every time. I mean, I don't come out and talk a lot, I just come here to teach my classes and I go home. I stood today a little extra time to speak to you about this because I have a four-year-old that's home sick, extremely sick at home, and I'm glad you did this first. So right after this I'm leaving.

We're having our first annual award dinner soon, February 28th at the Hoboken Grace, so I look forward to seeing you guys there. Hopefully everybody comes, okay? A lot of you guys are going to be acknowledged, and I'm very happy that I didn't say this, I said this to Barbara earlier, I'm very proud of your daughter.

CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you.

MR. RODRIGUEZ: She's in my class. I don't know if you -- today I came in, only reason why I came in to class today is to give eight kids their new uniforms, but now I'm going to take my time to leave. But, once again, I would like to stand here and say thank you again. I love you guys for allowing me to teach your kids, your grandkids,

1	and so on. So I know I don't say this much, but
2	thank you for allowing me to be here this many
3	years, and hopefully I make more kids go to college.
4	So that's my goal.
5	God bless you, thank you.
6	(Applause.)
7	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you.
8	Madera E.
9	MS. MADERA EVELYN: M-A-D-E-R-A,
10	E-V-E-L-Y-N. Evelyn. Got it?
11	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Got it.
12	MS. MADERA EVELYN: Okay. I just want
13	to ask three of or maybe four questions. The first
14	one is: A while back you had security guards
15	running the buildings. 8th and 9th Street are very,
16	very active, and I would like to know how come
17	there's no officers going around those two
18	buildings. That's one.
19	Two, when I do call, they tell me that
20	they don't have access to those buildings. I don't
21	know why, I don't know why.
22	Now, my next question is, there's a
23	vacancy under me and I would like to know, can
2 4	somebody explain to me how did that apartment got
25	taken over so quickly when the young lady just moved

out of there. And the only thing that I asked,
which my site manager answered halfway because she
was not privileged to that information, so she never
got back to me, is how can somebody get an apartment
so quick in less than a month? That's one. And
two, why am I getting a hard time moving from the
top down?

And the only question that I was asking was, whoever moves on top of me, are they going to be inconsiderate, they're going to make noise or what? Because I always stated yous pass policy in here, and the policies are never enforced. I mean, you pass policies not smoking, they still smoke; you pass policy not loud music, there's still loud music. You pass a lot of policies from the state that is never enforced in housing.

So, you know, it's who you want to pick on and who you don't. So far nobody picks on me because I'm neutral.

Congrats, Mike.

COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Thank you.

MS. MADERA EVELYN: So that's the only questions that I'm asking. And whenever -- whenever yous could answer it, on an e-mail or whatever, more than happy, you know, thank you.

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: What were the
2	two sites? What were the two sites again, Director?
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: What sites?
4	I'm sorry.
5	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: What are the
6	two sites she just said?
7	VOICE: It was 8th and 9th, 460 and
8	455.
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Christopher
10	Columbus Gardens.
11	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Barbara.
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes, Adrienne
13	Rawlins. Just state your name and spell it for the
14	Court Reporter, please.
15	MS. RAWLINS: A-D-R-I-E-N-N-E,
16	R-A-W-L-I-N-S.
17	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay.
18	MS. RAWLINS: Working on cars is
19	prohibited in the parking lots, yet it's going on
20	every week. It's a joke. There's, like, three or
21	four cars in different areas, people are under it,
22	fixing it, changing a tire, doing this, doing that.
23	No enforcement.
24	And with the issue of outsiders parking
25	in our parking lots, maybe if you informed the areas

around the Housing Authority here, HG, Fox Hill, 228
Adams, 221 Jackson, letting their management
companies know it's prohibited and your car will get
towed, maybe that will ease it a little bit. Highly
unlikely but.

The Resident Advisory Board, it's been three years and I haven't seen anything go out for nomination of new people. And -- because I'd like to apply again because the first time I couldn't do it because it was COVID, and during COVID there was no way on God's green earth I was going to knock on somebody's door, not knowing whether they had COVID or not, how severe it was, to protect my own self. So I wasn't appointed to the Board that way, but it is what it is.

And the meetings are supposed to be open to all HHA residents, housing choice voucher tenants, Commissioners, staff, and other guests.

These meetings are never public, they're never published, you don't know what's going on with the Resident Advisory Board or the Tenants' Association. And that seems secretive to me, and it should be allowed, you have it right here on your website, so that needs to change because I have other residents who would like to be involved, but they can't

1	because they can't get nominated or they can't get
2	answers. I mean, it's here, and if it's supposed to
3	be every three years, what are you waiting for?
4	VOICE: We haven't done it yet.
5	MS. RAWLINS: Should have been done
6	already.
7	VOICE: We haven't done it yet.
8	MS. RAWLINS: But it should have been
9	done already.
10	VOICE: We haven't done it yet.
11	MS. RAWLINS: Why?
12	VOICE: Because there has been given no
13	date for our next meeting.
14	MS. RAWLINS: The Housing Authority,
15	that's
16	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: That falls on the
17	tenant
18	MS. RAWLINS: Yeah, it needs to be
19	taken care of. And it's not that hard to schedule
20	something. Look at the calendar, see what's
21	available, get it done.
22	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you.
23	So, Director, I just want to kind of
24	piggyback on what Ms. Rawlins just said. She's
25	absolutely right. There is a Resident Advisory

L	Board and a tenant association, which I had served
2	prior to being on here, but those meetings are
3	supposed to be open to the tenants.

1.5

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Uh-huh.

CHAIRWOMAN REYES: To all the tenants.

And we all know here that that's not happening,

that's number one. So I think that needs to change.

Second of all is we do need to be more transparent with what's happening in these meetings because I know we have individuals that do represent their sections, but there are sections that are not represented. And the truth is, how many of these people that are representing our tenants are actually going out their and speaking to the tenants and finding out? Because that's what they're supposed to be doing as their — their individual is — I know here in this building they're very engaged and they speak to each other and they knock on doors and — but that doesn't happen in the family buildings, and I can attest to that, that that doesn't happen.

So I think that when these nominations do come up, that we need to make it clear that if you do want to serve on this Board, that it's not just for -- for you to gain whatever thing comes out

of that, it's also for you to actually engage with the residents, your neighbors. You have to know what their issues are, you have to know what the problems are. And I don't think that that is represented right now or what is happening with our Resident Advisory Board, and that's just my opinion as a resident here.

So I just felt like, since Ms. Rawlins brought it up, I think it's very important that when we move forward with nominations that we make this absolutely clear that if you're going to represent a section, you have to be engaged in your section.

(Applause.)

VOICE: Absolutely.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO:

Unfortunately, Daniel is not here, but we have talked to Daniel and we scheduled elections for the beginning of 2024. Right after the holidays there will be elections because it is — it is time, by the way, it's time. So it's the three years we'll be here. So the last time we held them I believe in 2021, 2024 we'll be doing elections again. And I would agree that folks should be out talking to their folks. But I will say that the Resident Advisory Board meetings are pretty lively. People

1	don't hold back at those meetings. Yes
2	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
3	VOICE: No, we don't.
4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: No, you
5	don't. So but
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: And that's
7	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: And I do
8	think to make them public would be a great idea.
9	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: It is. I think it's
10	important, and I know that you guys say and I
11	know most of these ladies, I know most of them, and
12	the gentleman that serve on there. I'm not saying
13	that they're doing anything wrong, but it doesn't
14	look like we're being transparent, and it also seems
15	to some residents that they're not being represented
16	as they should be represented. So yes, our tenants
17	should also be a part of those meetings.
18	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Madam Chair.
19	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Sure.
20	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Have you ever
21	thought about changing the time if some residents
22	work in the family buildings?
23	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Which is the issue
24	most of the time.
25	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Then maybe you

1	could alternate times? If it's happening during the
2	day, then the next month happens
3	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: In the evening.
4	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: in the
5	evening so everybody can participate?
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: We got I
7	think that's great. And we're going to have a new
8	Board the first quarter, so I think I think we
9	can make a fresh start with that new Board.
10	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: So we can now
11	MS. BIART: See, this is what happens
12	when we come to these meetings. All we hear all the
13	time we can express ourselves and we have to say
14	what we feel. I'm one that I want to fight for
15	everybody, because you know what, we're entitled to
16	that, and there's things that we want that yous
17	already made your mind up and decided, you let us
18	know when everything is already decided.
19	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank
20	MS. BIART: Give us a chance.
21	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you, Margie, I
22	appreciate that.
23	Director, that was all for public
24	portion, if you'd like to move forward with your
25	report.

1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I will,
2	thank you, Ms. Chairman. We have had an exciting
3	month here at the Housing Authority. We've had the
4	bittersweet dedication of the courtyard at Harrison
5	Gardens.
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Excuse me, could you
7	just keep it down while the director is speaking?
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: With the
9	placement of the plaque in honor of Arlette Braxton,
10	we had a nice event there, it was very sweet, a few
11	tears and some laughter, but I think the plaque
12	looks beautiful there, and we continue to honor her.
13	We along with Familyhood sponsored a
14	very successful Trunk or Treat along 4th Street, a
15	true family event for all of Hoboken.
16	We have designed and are ordering the
17	plaque in honor of Ms. Forbes. We expect about a
18	six-week turnaround on that plaque.
19	Once again, we hosted elections at
20	numerous sites with great success. Congratulations
21	to all of our partners and local government that won
22	re-election, including the one that's sitting in the
23	room.
24	As we all know oh, I should mention,
25	I got really good news yesterday from an old friend

of ours, Latrenda Ross, that the Hoboken -- Hoboken Coalition has chosen the Hoboken Housing Authority as the beneficiary of their annual gift drive, and they will be collecting over the holidays laundry detergent, stuff for laundry, stuff for cleaning, and they will be arranging with us to give that out to Hoboken Housing Authority residents. We just got notification of that, and Latrenda is the chair of that group. So thank you, Latrenda, for doing that for us. And as that progresses, we'll have more news. That just came in.

We continue to work with the Hoboken police department, and our residents security committee met with HPD yesterday.

Chairman of the committee you want to say a thing or two?

talked about -- we had a productive call with the chief, we thank them for their time, we talked about the senior citizen buildings and having a more of a presence with our officers walking the buildings so that our residents can see that, you know, they care about the safety of all the residents and just they're more visible. They agreed to that. They're going to supply some numbers and data, I think, that

sergeant has for us later in this meeting. What
else did we talk about? We --

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I think just overall security.

COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah, the security contract that we have that, you know, we want to make sure that the security guards are doing what we pay them for. We talked about that extensively to make sure that, you know, we're not paying these guys to be sleeping overnight. And that I think that contract is going to be up in a couple of months.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes.

COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So we're going to be looking to see if it makes sense to keep them or to go out to bid for a new one. Yeah, it was a productive meeting. I requested from them to get some data to see exactly what the frequency is for the officers to walk in this specific building so that — because I knew that you guys are going to be here tonight, so we're curious to see exactly what the results say, and the intent was not to say that they're not doing their job or they're not walking through every building, but sometimes data and numbers speak volumes, and, you know, we want to see

1	actual facts about where the cops are and how much
2	they're patrolling, you know, our property.
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Right. And
4	we talked, I think, about responding to you say too.
5	Like Evelyn brought up you'd like to see them more
6	at Christopher Columbus, I think we'd like to seem
7	them, more here, so I think
8	VOICE: I'm sorry. Down back you have
9	mostly disabled and senior on those two buildings.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, that's
11	correct. So we'll be working. And I think we had a
12	really good meeting with them. I think they're
13	really open to us and responsive to us, so we'll
14	keep that up with them.
15	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And I'm sure
16	the sergeant will address the, you know, not having
17	access to those two buildings.
18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, they
19	got access. But unless hello.
20	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Can you do
21	you want to do that now or Director?
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I didn't see
23	you there. Why not? We're here.
24	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: We just asked
25	the Hoboken Police Department to give us, you know,

1	a monthly spotlight, some tricks of the trade to
2	maybe keep you guys safe and things to remember, so
3	if you want to we appreciate Sergeant McCourt,
4	right?
5	SGT. MCCOURT: Yeah, Sergeant McCourt.
6	Hello, everybody.
7	So I prepared numbers for the month of
8	October for this building specifically. We were
9	so you're aware, whenever the police department
10	either responds to a call or calls out a detail
11	check, is what we label it, it's kind of like either
12	a dismounted patrol or there's police officers that
13	are in the area specifically for a reason in regards
14	to an address, that is logged with our dispatch in
15	our CAD system so there's a way to go through it.
16	For the month of October, we were in
17	this building 91 times, an average of three times a
18	day. More than half of that was proactive
19	proposals, not response, it was the police
20	department coming here doing detail checks, walking
21	the building, talking to people in the community
22	room. More than half of the times we responded to
23	this building were proactive proposals. The
24	other

COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Do you have a

1	number? Do you know the an exact number?
2	SGT. MCCOURT: It was
3	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: It's like 50.
4	SGT. MCCOURT: Yeah, it was 91 total
5	times, and then it was just over half of that was
6	specifically related to proactive
7	VOICE: I see them on my floor.
8	SGT. MCCOURT: So there's and then
9	the other ones are medical calls or any other calls
10	for service from this building. So that's just the
11	month of October, like I said, 91 times we were
12	here, that's an average of approximately three times
13	a day. That's one building amongst how many
14	buildings?
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: About 24.
16	SGT. MCCOURT: Right, 24 buildings
17	throughout the whole authority, we were here 91
18	times in just the course of that month. So if
19	there's any questions that you have directly related
20	to those numbers, again, this is coming off of
21	yesterday's meeting, I pulled those quickly.
22	There's that's just the tip of what I, like, we
23	could have delved into more details for other
24	buildings, I wasn't prepared to do that, it takes a
25	little bit of time to do that.

1	I don't have the numbers for 460 8th
2	Street or 455 9th Street, I do know that we do have
3	access. If you want to speak after the meeting,
4	I'll try to get some information from you to where
5	you got that information that we do not have access,
6	I'll look into that. Our keycards work the same way
7	they work for this building as that building. And I
8	do know for a fact that our officers do patrol. I
9	don't have the numbers, again, but I do know that
10	VOICE: Well, I have my apartment
11	booby-trapped, so I get to see the cops if they come
12	around on my floor.
13	SGT. MCCOURT: Okay.
14	VOICE: So I have I have data on
15	that perspect.
16	SGT. MCCOURT: Okay.
17	VOICE: Because of, you know. Anyhow.
18	SGT. MCCOURT: Okay.
19	VOICE: But
20	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Sergeant, I just
21	have a few questions. Unfortunately, I wasn't part
22	of the meeting because it was during the workday and
23	I was working, but are you guys patrolling the
24	family buildings such as Harrison Gardens?
25	SGT. MCCOURT: We I don't pull

numbers specifically for I didn't, like I said,
we were prepared for specifically for this building.
I can't speak for all three shifts on what they do
throughout the course of their patrols. I do know
that there's a district car assigned to this
district for $24/7$, for lack of a better term.
There's we don't require certain buildings to be
patrolled at a certain time or it's up to the
officer that dictates the way that they patrol their
district. Unless if there's a reason to go, there's
some stimulus that's bringing us there or something,
there's information that is leading us to be in the
specific area.

asking is because I was part of the last security committee and it was my understanding that those buildings were being — having walk—throughs. And as a Commissioner, someone who's not only lives here, works in the community, and I do relate a lot to the residents, a lot of the complaints that I have been receiving have been from the hanging out in the Harrison Gardens hallways. So I can't tell you a specific building because I think I've had complaints from all four buildings.

A prime example is last night, what

happened last night in those — in those hallways, which was Harrison Gardens. And what kind of upsets me, I always give you guys your kudos, you guys do amazing jobs. And yes, you're absolutely right, we do have a patrolman that parks on Jackson Street and is there all day. But what good is the patrolman in the car if something is happening inside the building? Guys are hanging in the buildings.

They — our tenants have to walk through this.

I mean, I see it on social media, I don't even see it -- I'm not seeing it from the other aspect, but if I'm seeing it on social media, I'm pretty sure that the staff of the Housing Authority is seeing the hanging out in the hallways, as well as you guys who have access to the cameras. So where I understand that, you know, it's -- basically what you just said was that well, we'll walk it if we feel that it's a problem. I think that since I've been part of the security committee, since I lived in Harrison Gardens, Harrison Gardens has always been a troubled spot.

So I don't think that that should have ever wavered where the officers were not walking, and we know that the specific times when these problems happen are the nighttime. It's getting

cold, and it's only going to get worse. They're not going to be hanging out on 3rd and Harrison, they're going to be hanging in the hallways of Harrison Gardens. So I feel like we need to get a grasp on it now before it gets worse.

SGT. MCCOURT: I agree with you. So like I said, I don't know, numbers-wise I don't have those. I do know that officers patrol each building within the Housing Authority. The buildings that have more of an issue or potential to have an issue are hit more often than the ones that aren't. If there's a specific complaint that comes through the security committee or any representative of housing or a citizen or a resident, we do take priority in managing those complaints.

Last night, I will tell you that we did not receive one call for a complaint of somebody hanging out in the hallway. I was working last night, nothing leading up to what happened was there a complaint from a citizen.

CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: And that's important, that residents call. I mean, sometimes you don't think it's important but it is important.

25 CHAIRWOMAN REYES: And I tell them

1	that, because a lot of the times the officers are
2	hearing from me, right, so I'm the one that's
3	usually giving the complaints. I'm hearing the
4	complaint from everyone, but the only one who is
5	speaking is me. So I do I say to them, please
6	call. But you know what they say to me? No, what
7	if they find out that it's me, they're coming after
8	me.
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah.
10	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Not everybody is
11	okay with having people, you know, any type of
12	individual knowing, especially that type of
13	individual, knowing that they're the ones calling,
14	so, you know, it's hard, it's hard. I lived in that
15	building, I know how hard it is. And it's only
16	getting worse.
17	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: We are getting
18	new cameras in the hallways, too, so that
19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: We are
20	getting cameras in each hallway and the stairwells.
21	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So they'll be
22	able to see that
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: That'll
24	help.
25	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: and

1	directly send someone, so that will
2	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Which will
3	help.
4	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: But another problem
5	is
6	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
7	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Andrew, with what
8	you just said, the cameras are only being watched
9	after something happens, they're not being watched.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: 24/7.
11	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: So that's an issue.
12	Even if you're not doing a walk-through, but you're
13	looking at the camera at a certain time, then maybe
14	send, you know, like maybe that could work. But,
15	again, I can't tell you guys, I know you guys are
16	busy.
17	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Is it possible
18	to get those access to the camera to, like, an
19	officer that's on duty? Like, on his phone or to
20	see access so instead of, like, then maybe we can
21	have
22	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I call Gino
23	Giacobelli to the stand.
24	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: For those of you who
25	don't know me, I'm Captain Gino Giacobelli. I've

1	been here a million years. I used to play around
2	the corner. I won a bunch of championships
3	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
4	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: around the corner
5	too.
6	It's just not fair for Duke to some of
7	them he's not going to be in some of those
8	decisions. But the issue, I think, we have to
9	understand here, and I'm glad Duke hit on it and we
10	have to really just be honest about it, is it's
11	going to take some community involvement, it's going
12	to, because you could call and you could stay
13	anonymous if you have to, but if we put an officer
14	in that hallway and he walks up and down, he's going
15	to leave there eventually, he's going to go to
16	another building, then somebody is going to act up
17	in that building, right? So, like, we can't be
18	everywhere all the time.
19	I do feel for you and I do understand
20	how rough it is to make the phone call and all of a
21	sudden worry that somebody is going to, you know,
22	come back and lash out at you. But you can make the
23	call anonymously. Nobody says, you know.
24	VOICE: You got caller ID.
25	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Well, we

1	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
2	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: first of all,
3	I'll teach you how to block your number so you don't
4	have to worry about calling.
5	VOICE: My brother, you remember?
6	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: I don't remember
7	that particular, when it happened, but what I'm
8	saying is, if you
9	VOICE: He went
10	COURT STENOGRAPHER: Could you speak
11	into the microphone?
12	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: I'm sorry. I'm
13	sorry. I should be addressing you guys.
1 4	If you do call and you don't get the
15	service you like, like you had said before that when
16	you called, they didn't send anybody or they said
17	they couldn't come, whatever
18	VOICE: They didn't have access.
19	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: You have to well,
20	you have to at least ask for the desk, ask for a
21	supervisor, ultimately you could talk to internal
22	affairs, nobody gets more frustrated with bad police
23	work than police officers. When we hear that the
2 4	job didn't get done correctly, it fires us up beyond
25	belief. I'm in work every morning 6 o'clock with

the Chief. We go over what went wrong the day before and what we're going to do better the next day. And believe me, as frustrated as you are because you're living it, and I could never feel what you're feeling living it, I live it from the job perspective, and we want to do the best possible job. I mean, Barbara, you know, we want to do the best possible job we can for you guys. We want to be in your lives, we consider you part of our lives, and the better we do for you, the more you love us, the more we love each other, and it's kumbaya all around, all around the block.

So communication between you and us has to constantly happen. That's why we show up here all the time, that's why we show up at meetings all the time, and when you — when you're seeing something in the building, you have to talk amongst each other and call it in.

VOICE: Yes.

CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Now, as far as I do want to address the one elephant that always comes up in the room. As far as the officer sitting in the car on Jackson Street, I'm going to stand up here in front of you guys -- hello, by the way, it's Ms. Seitzman. How you doing -- and say that that

1	happens. Sometimes human nature kicks in, they lap
2	around, nothing is going on, they go in a different
3	building, they come back, somebody gets a coffee,
4	something happens, and they sit down and they take a
5	break. That infuriates us too, it does, and we deal
6	with it.
7	When it happens, we'll go look at it
8	and we'll go, that can't happen. To sit here and
9	tell you that that's never going to happen again
10	will probably not would not be true. It's like a
11	kid getting in trouble at school, they're going to
12	do it again at some point, right? But we'll keep
13	addressing it until we get better at it, we'll keep
14	addressing it until
15	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
16	VOICE: We have to
17	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So now your
18	policy with the officers is they're supposed to be
19	walking around.
20	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: The officer at this
21	location should be doing the same thing that the
22	officers should be doing at any location, be active
23	in the community.
24	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Correct.
25	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: If you're on

1	Washington Street, you stop in and get a water,
2	you're supposed to ask the guy that owns the place,
3	"What's going on? How are you? What's your name?
4	I never met you before. You see anything around
5	here that you don't like that's happening? You
6	could tell me. Any way you could help me? Any way
7	I could help you?" It's supposed to happen like
8	that.
9	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So the sitting
10	in the car or the standing by the car is just like
11	a
12	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: It's a function
13	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
14	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: it's a function
15	of I walked around a bunch times already and now I'm
16	going to sit I think.
17	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I think that's
18	where, like, the frustration is, because
19	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yeah, uh-huh, for us
20	too.
21	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I mean, I seem
22	like every time I drop by that area
23	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Right.
24	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: and I don't
25	know if it's just a freak, like, coincidence

1	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yeah, yeah, yeah.
2	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: every time
3	I drive by or, like, every time you walk by, or,
4	like, every time, they're sitting there.
5	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yeah.
6	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So, like
7	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yeah, we see it, we
8	see it.
9	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: It can't be
10	that rare.
11	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: No, no, we see it as
12	well, we see it as well. And I think what's
13	happening is it's
14	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
15	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And this is
16	not the first time we this is, like, years of
17	talking about it.
18	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Right, right. Well,
19	I think I don't know, Duke didn't pull these kind
20	of numbers either, and we could talk numbers all the
21	time, we used to flood you guys with reports and
22	stuff every time something happened. Sometimes too
23	much information. What are you going to do with it,
24	you're going to sift through tons of information, it
25	goes nowhere.

1	But the projects right now has been
2	pretty much as safe as it's been in forever, you
3	know. Inside inside the senior buildings, I know
4	you guys have a concern, and that's why we want to
5	address that.
6	VOICE: I see the cops
7	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: The calls for
8	service around here from the CAD, they're down
9	tremendously, they're down tremendously. They're
10	down tremendously, so
11	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Well, yeah, I
12	probably pushed back, I mean, I've been on the Board
13	for, I think, my sixth year now.
14	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yeah.
15	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: This I
16	wouldn't declare this year as the safest year in the
17	Housing Authority.
18	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: If you're looking at
19	the number of actual calls that have come in over
20	the years. If you're looking at the number of calls
21	that have come in over the years, especially for
22	violent crimes, recent history, of course, has got
23	my timing terrible right now for whats happened last
24	night, we understand that. And by the way, we're
25	all over it. We were over it in ten minutes, we

1 were all over it.

2 COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: But there have 3 been, like, four or five of those this year.

CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yes. But if you look at the standard of -- listen, again, I like to keep it real, I'm born and raised in this town, just like Michael, just like a lot of us. There was a time it was hard to walk down here without getting into a fist fight. We're just not there. I come down here with my kids, I coach down here, I come down here for all the charitable events. I'm going to walk out of here right now and walk home. I'm going to walk through there. I don't have no police paraphernalia. I'm not worried to walk out this door right now. You're not worried to walk home right now.

We're doing a good job down here, I think, for the most part. I think definitely.

We're going to do better. We'll always do better.

We'll always do better. But this area, I'm going to go out on a limb, without any numbers in front of me, and say this three by four area is as safe as any three by four area in the town. I would say it is.

1	VOICE: It broke the schedule last
2	night.
3	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yeah, it did. It
4	did.
5	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: And again
7	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: I can't argue.
8	We'll put some numbers together.
9	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: I'm not saying that
10	you guys aren't doing a good job.
11	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yes.
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: I think that with
13	one thing that we change now that maybe makes us
14	work better together is that we actually get in
15	front of the problem, right, where before we
16	waited
17	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Share information.
18	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: for an issue to
19	happen and then everybody was all over it to make
20	sure it didn't happen again. So I think that's one
21	of the good things. But I kind of feel, being a
22	resident down here, I get it from your perspective
23	as an officer, but as a resident, when you stand
2 4	there and say that we probably are the safest that
25	we've ever been, I'll be honest with you, I've lived

1	here for so many years, and the last few years have
2	not been the safest.
3	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: So when just out
4	curiosity, when would you consider was the safest
5	time period in your life down here?
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: I'll be honest with
7	you, back when I first moved here things weren't as
8	bad as they are now. We didn't have shootings. I
9	think when I first moved on here it was probably
10	more than 15 years ago, I want to say, and maybe we
11	had one shooting, it was, in that whole time, like,
12	one and that was it.
13	VOICE: There was fist fighting.
14	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: But shooting and
15	VOICE: Better than shooting.
16	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
17	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: That's true.
18	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: shootings, fist
19	fights, and violence has definitely risen in the
20	Housing Authority.
21	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: You know, the
22	younger element
23	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
24	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: In the last few
25	years. I mean, you could be working here as a

manager, director, even you guys who have served on this Board for a while, I think we have not heard more complaints about the violence and what's happening here than we've ever heard before.

CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Well, here you go, it circles back to what I said when we first started, then all that information has got to do a better job of getting to us. Because if we have cops down here 24/7 and they're sitting in the car, then that obviously means, to use Duke's verbiage, there was no stimulus bringing them anywhere else, you understand what I'm saying? So if you're having calls for violence, it's not getting to us as best we can.

And before I get dismissed here and sit down, which I'll always talk to you guys as much as possible here or outside, to have cameras on every floor and everything, it's going to be more of an investigative tool, it just is. You cannot have, you wouldn't even want big brother, you would not want to be watched all day and all night. I would not want cameras in my — everywhere I live. I wouldn't want to walk out in the hall to get the paper in my underwear and know that you're looking at me. You don't want that. You know?

1	VOICE: Me, I'm going to ask you to put
2	on a robe.
3	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Right, you're going
4	to want me to put on a robe, believe me, believe me.
5	So that's not really going to be what you want.
6	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: The one thing that
7	I would probably say is that I think we have to
8	differentiate what the violent crime is, right?
9	So
10	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yeah.
11	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I think you're
12	absolutely right about the shootings.
13	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yes.
14	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Specifically.
15	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Shoot-wise, yes.
16	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: But you hear about
17	that, okay? You don't hear about the guy who walked
18	out of the bar, picked up a bottle, and smashed it
19	over somebody's head.
20	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Exactly, exactly.
21	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Right. So the
22	perception of what those are could be very different
23	too. And, again, I don't know the numbers, I'm just
24	going on. I think the violent crime in the Housing
25	Authority is very, very different than the violent

1	crime on Washington Street at 3 o'clock in the
2	morning after the bars are closed.
3	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: No question about
4	it.
5	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Right. So I think
6	that's what we got to kind of look at and
7	differentiate which one is which. Because I think
8	you're right in the sense that there are shootings.
9	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yes.
10	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: And we know about
11	them instantaneously, we don't know about the guy
12	who got hit with the bottle because it was
13	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
14	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: I mean, I'll close
15	with this, Mike, not to cut you off, I consider
16	somebody coming into my home a violent crime, right,
17	a burglary, whether you interact with me or not, if
18	you come into my building, it's kind of scary. It
19	happens around the city more than it happens here.
20	Fights happen, aggravated assaults like Michael just
21	described eloquently, they happen other places more
22	than it happens here. The fact that you're going to
23	get a shooting here kind of puts it, like, over the
24	top, the one shooting trumps 42 different things. I
25	know what you're saying.

1	What I'm saying it's on the regular,
2	day-to-day, around the clock, I'm going to go get my
3	milk from the store, it's pretty good. It's pretty
4	good.
5	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Yeah, yeah.
6	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I mean, to say
7	that this is the safest three to four block area
8	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: That it's been.
9	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: in
10	Hoboken
11	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: No, I said that it's
12	been, not that it's the safest, it's as safe as any
13	other area, I'm going to submit, and it's as safe as
14	it has been is what I'm saying.
15	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Oh, okay.
16	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: As it has been
17	historically.
18	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: What is that?
19	COMMISSIONER LEWIT: I agree with him,
20	I was born and raised here as well.
21	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: No, I thought
22	the comment was that this is the three to four block
23	safest area in the town, I thought that's what you
2 4	said.
25	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Right, right, no.

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And I was I
2	would push back to you
3	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: I'd even push back a
4	little on that.
5	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: You know, I'd
6	rather, you know
7	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
8	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I'd rather
9	walk
10	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
11	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: on
12	Bloomfield between 8th or 9th and 14th than, you
13	know, which is odd, you know.
14	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Right, right, right.
15	VOICE: But you're safer here than 14th
16	street.
17	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yeah, well.
18	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: I think one of the
19	things that's different from the rest of the town
20	and just on this whole kind of stuff is that the
21	Housing Authority residents do stick together,
22	right? So they know their residents, they know
23	their people, right? They know, so when something
2 4	happens they come together. We
2.5	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: Yeah.

1	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: have noticed, and
2	you as part of security noticed that the people that
3	are causing the problems are not the residents from
4	here, they're not, that's the problem. It's the
5	people that don't live here that are causing it. So
6	yes, I feel I feel comfortable sending my
7	daughter to the store because I know that my
8	neighbor or the guy in the next building is watching
9	them because they know them. Oh, Barbara, your
10	daughter, I just saw your daughter, she went that
11	way, right?
12	So you feel comfortable, but that's
13	because that's a resident. Oh, she lives here, I'll
14	like out for her child. And that's how it is across
15	the board, where in other parts of town they don't
16	have that. And so I think that's what
17	differentiates us. So we stick more like a
18	community than the rest of the town.
19	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: That might
20	lead to our next topic, and thanks for your time.
21	CAPT. GIACOBELLI: No, no problem.
22	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: While we're
23	talking about it, to that point
24	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you.
25	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: what we

1	talked about, our attorney getting back to them,
2	about the chief, about the agreement.
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes.
4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Can we get an
5	update from the attorney? The, what is it
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, I
7	talked to Harold about this I talked to Harold
8	about this yesterday, and I know they're working on
9	it. He's going to check with I think, Harold,
10	you're on the line, right?
11	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes.
12	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Yes, I am.
13	Good evening, everyone. This is Harold Fitzpatrick.
14	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Good
15	evening, Harold, and I know you're going to talk to
16	Matt
17	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I can report
18	to you that I checked with Matthew on that today,
19	and he's been in communication with the assistant
20	city attorney, and he's working on a revision in our
21	agreement with the City to address some of the
22	issues that have come up in the last couple of
23	discussions between the Authority and the police
24	department.
25	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Great.

1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: So we have
2	some movement there.
3	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Good. Good.
4	Thanks.
5	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I would like
6	to say something just in closing on that. I'm very
7	sensitive to folks because I hear this so much
8	that
9	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Guys, can we stop
10	the talking in the background, please, while the
11	director is speaking?
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah. Can
13	we get everyone talking here? So I'm very sensitive
14	to that. And many people do, and I will continue to
15	encourage it, most of you in this room have my cell
16	phone number, right? If you're reticent about
17	calling, call me, right? If you hear from the
18	police that they can't enter and it bothers you,
19	call me, and I will get that to the police. I get
20	calls at two in the morning, I get calls at three in
21	the morning. Fine, fine, that's what we're here
22	for. Myself and Frank over here, that's what we do.
23	So feel very free to do that if you're
24	worried, because if I call and tell them there's a
25	bunch of guys in the hallway at 310, they'll go.

1	And if you call they'll go too, but if I call I
2	don't say who called me, right? So there's no way
3	to link that back to you. So feel free to do that.
4	I just wanted to add that.

You know, and if you don't have my cell phone number, I'll give you my card before we leave today.

So we are having a --

COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Put it on social

media.

media, yeah, that's okay, we'll drop it from a helicopter. We'll do that. I don't mind that at all.

We are having our meet and greets coming up in November. I'll be at every site the last week in November. On the 28th of November, Fox Hill and Harrison, on the 29th Adams and CCG, and on the 30th here at Monroe. You'll get fliers on that coming out in the next week or so. So we'll have a chance to sit and talk about all of these issues as well. The police have promised to come, so the police are going to be at our meet and greets this time, and we're going to have a good presentation on some new HUD regs for you as well, so that will be

1	fine. We'll be at each site over that time period.
2	Harrison and Andrew Jackson on the 28th of November.
3	The security meeting met. We went
4	through that.
5	I've got I started the meeting to
6	talk about an exciting month. We have been got
7	some excellent news regarding our Hoboken Housing
8	Forward. As part of the process of redevelopment
9	with HUD, we've received our CHAPS or commitment to
10	enter into housing assistance payments contract on
11	Andrew Jackson and Christopher Columbus this month.
12	That's a significant step forward with HUD, clears a
13	lot of things up, our path to the future. We
14	already have CHAPS on Adams and Monroe, and Harrison
15	will be following in due course. There's no
16	question it will be coming soon.
17	All of these are significant milestone
18	and represents a lot and excellent work by staff and
19	our Enterprise partners and tech assistance team.
20	So as we go through our process with the city,
21	hopefully very soon, finalizing the redevelopment
22	plan.
23	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Planning Board's
24	going on right now.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Planning

1	Board's going on, we've got that happening.
2	We've got we will then be going out
3	for a developer partner. We are moving and we're
4	really excited about that.
5	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Are we not
6	able to go out to the development partner, like, now
7	so that when it does get approved we can if we're
8	ready, speeding it up.
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: The
10	developer partner needs the redevelopment plan
11	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Right.
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: in order
13	to even do his starting bid on.
14	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And that's
15	tonight, that's being
16	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: The Planning Board
17	is hearing it tonight, it will be voted on at the
18	Council meeting on Wednesday.
19	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So we can't do
20	it
21	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Monday.
22	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Monday, right,
23	excuse me. Monday.
24	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: But that's all
25	ready to go is my point, right? Like, we're

1	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: So we're getting
2	there, we've just brought we've also brought on
3	our development attorney this past week, we've got
4	the contract finalized.
5	Thank you, Harold, for that.
6	We've got the contract finalized, all
7	that, so we'll be having our initial meetings with
8	them over the next couple of weeks so
9	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Great.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: ready to
11	do up that RFP and make it happen.
12	Capital leave plan consultants in front
13	of you tonight, I'll talk to you about that when we
14	come to that part. We're continuing to meet
15	regularly with our redevelopment team, and we're
16	working on our projecting our management needs.
17	You're going to be seeing over the next few months a
18	new Section 8 admin plan, some additions to our
19	admissions and occupancy policy, and the current
20	five and annual plans submitted to HUD, with just
21	some minor tweaks heading and clearing the way for
22	redevelopment, as well as some new regs that HUD has
23	put out.
24	Our next induction ceremony for Hall of
25	Fame is December 13th. December 13th, 6 o'clock.

1	Put it on your calendar. We'll be here to induct
2	our next round of individuals for the HHA Hall of
3	Fame.
4	I continue to meet with residents. We
5	met with eight resident families this past month.
6	We encourage you to come on in and sit down in my
7	office and talk to me. In addition, we'll have that
8	round of meet and greets at each site during the
9	week of November 27th.
10	We have been sensitive, I think, since
11	last month's meeting at Fox Hill talking about
12	security concerns and how we're doing lease
13	violations, we've been working on that with the
14	security committee and with the police department.
15	We have been in touch with our security firm
16	regarding reporting and improving their performance,
17	and as Andrew said earlier, we're going to be
18	rebidding that in the near future.
19	Let's see. Housing for Hoboken met on
20	October 24th. We had a meeting with the Hoboken
21	schools, with the school board folks, that was
22	excellent.

23 And, Barbara, thank you for helping set 24 that up.

I think it was a good meeting, just to

1	start talking about how the redevelopment will
2	affect the Hoboken school system.
3	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: We want to be a part
4	of it, we want to be
5	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah. And
6	last but not least, have a school room here, let's
7	do it
8	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: That's a great
9	idea.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: part of
11	the schools down here. So we had a good meeting
12	with them and they're very receptive.
13	Special capital projects, we've got the
14	Harrison thing going on with the cameras coming on
15	on each floor. Our courtyard paving is under
16	design, all of that's under design right now.
17	Emergency generator work is still in process. We
18	got a boiler replacement at 655 Marshall Drive. And
19	by the way, it's also at 501, 540, and 320 that
20	we're replacing boilers this year. Last but not
21	least, the Monroe boiler replacement is out for bid
22	right now.
23	We continue to work on our UPCS and
24	REAC inspection issues. Our sprinkler head project
25	is completed. A couple of punch list items,

interior door replacement is complete, plaster work is in process, as well as kitchen cabinet repair and our window repairs.

We continue with training on our inspired protect protocol for the new inspection system. And I would like to say clearly in response to some concerns that have been expressed, if you think you've been charged for anything that's not your damage, that you didn't damage, please go see your manager and we'll talk about it. If there's something that, like we replaced a door in your unit and you don't think it was your damage, come on in, we'll talk about it, and if it was indeed just wear and tear, you don't get charged for normal wear and tear, you don't. So come on in and talk to us about it.

Parking registration initiative is underway. We kind of beat that one already to death on that. I didn't do a report on the management snapshot. We are continuing a good occupancy rate, 95 percent, at our public housing, and we're at 96 percent at -- at occupancy at Fox Hill.

Our rent collection issues, we continue to work hard on that. Our percentage of families that have -- that owe us dropped again, which is a

1	good indication, so the number of families that
2	actually owe us has dropped and is moving in the
3	right direction. We have gone ahead and filed court
4	actions on a number of our outstanding accounts.
5	Anything I haven't covered on that,
6	Frank that you'd like to wherever you are?
7	MR. MERCHAND: No, you covered it up
8	pretty good.
9	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Do you have
10	the updated sheet for that?
11	MR. MERCHAND: Yes, it should be in
12	there.
13	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: What number is
14	that?
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Attachment,
16	attachment A and D. D is the aging report, D is the
17	actual dollar aging report, the D in your folder.
18	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: D.
19	MR. MERCHAND: The snapshot is a good
20	one because it kind of gives you that whole picture,
21	pulls from the other one.
22	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah, but it
23	doesn't show where we were.
2 4	MR. MERCHAND: Oh. So last month we
25	were at 40 percent, and the amount of families was

1	at and the month before was, like, I think 42, so
2	since we started tracking and giving you the
3	snapshot one, what I can do next month, I'll give
4	you a good

COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah, yeah, I remember seeing the sheet where it started, it was like --

(Simultaneous crosstalk.)

COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: -- 1.2 million right, now we're down to 820,000?

MR. MERCHAND: So what I want to talk about a little bit that was — that really worked this month that was exciting was the — I know we keep going back to the parking, but through the parking we got a lot of families to recertify that had not come into recertify, because in order to get a parking sticker, you need to be lease compliant, which means you either enter into a repayment agreement if you were late on rent, so through the parking registration, we got another 35 families to enter into repayment agreements, which is good for them, it's good for us. And then we did — our number last month was \$875,000 was what the families owed, so even though it's only 60-something thousand dollars less, there were also some repayment

agreements who people defaulted on from that first batch who we had to put back. So those big ones are ones that we're going to be going to court with that are already the most egregious ones. So as families entered in the beginning of this process, families entered into repayment agreements, and some, they didn't make payments on the repayments, so now those families are going right back to the top of our court agreement.

And what I'm working with Matt now is Matt is actually now going to give me, so that we start filling them out, the -- now the Court repayment agreements, which is different. See, when it's with us, we give you ten years no interest, right? If it's through the Court, it's going to probably be, like, two years, and, you know, it's -and then once it's a court agreement, if you miss a payment, it's a very expedited step to eviction, and we do not want that. What we do -- we're not looking for eviction, we're just looking for -- so as many families as they can honor our repayment agreement would be better so that they don't go into -- because that repayment agreement that comes through the Court is going to be a much higher monthly payment, and the default is automatic.

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: How many
2	families are in court write now?
3	MR. MERCHAND: So we have batches.
4	Now, the very first batch, that was the August
5	families, there's 10. Then after that there should
6	be 20 each month, 25. And so in total we're almost
7	up to 75 or 100 families who are eventually going to
8	come in batches to the point. I want to let you
9	know that
10	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So, wait, hold
11	on. So it looks like it's three
12	MR. MERCHAND: We're not in court with
13	all the families that are here.
14	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: 400
15	families
16	MR. MERCHAND: Right.
17	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: owe a
18	balance.
19	MR. MERCHAND: Right, and we're not in
20	court.
21	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: You're saying
22	175 are in court?
23	MR. MERCHAND: No, no, not even a
24	hundred no.
25	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Seventy-five to

1	100.
2	MR. MERCHAND: Yeah, 75.
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Not even
4	that are in court yet.
5	MR. MERCHAND: Not in court. They're
6	in the process of which starts with the first 10
7	families. Matt explained to me that there are
8	the families who might take four months before that
9	first file ones, we're actually in front of a judge.
10	Once we're actually in front of a judge, there won't
11	be a month after that that we won't be in front. So
12	the very first batch has 10 families, and after that
13	there will always be at least 20 to 30.
14	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So zero
15	families have been in front of a judge?
16	MR. MERCHAND: Zero families have been
17	in front of a judge. So, you know, we still have
18	time for families who want to, you know, work with
19	us before we get to that point.
20	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: So this month or
21	next month, they'll be in front of a judge?
22	MR. MERCHAND: No. Matt's not on the
23	call, but I think he explained to me it may still
24	be, like, another two to three months before we have
25	that first date, but whatever that first date is,

1	once we're there, it's going to be
2	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: This is
3	Harold, I'm on the call and I'm familiar. So far
4	we've actually filed ten complaints.
5	MR. MERCHAND: Yes.
6	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Frank said,
7	and the issue that I think Frank is addressing is
8	the fact that as the courts gear up to go back to
9	accept cases, they're doing it at a much slower pace
10	than they had historically. Historically we had a
11	court date every month, and we would make filings
12	and we would get hearings every month. Now almost
13	everything is being still done remotely, and it may
14	take, as Frank says, several months before the Court
15	is actually prepared to address a complaint after
16	it's been filed. It's going to take longer than it
17	used to.
18	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And while
19	that's happening, these families are still living
20	here
21	MR. MERCHAND: They're still
22	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: and we're
23	still not getting any contact?
24	MR. MERCHAND: And we cannot not
25	just that, we cannot collect rent from them. So

1	that's what I wanted you to know
2	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So 400
3	families we can't get in touch with them?
4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: No, just the

ones --

MR. MERCHAND: Just the ones that are in court. So if anyone who has not — that is not yet with that notice to cease and we're like this, and they're getting their letters but we haven't yet contacted them, if they're not in court, we can then at that point still work something out. Once we're in court, and what we're seeing is that, you know, unfortunate — and what we started was with the most egregious amounts, so that's what I wanted to get at.

There were some families that had 15, \$20,000 right? And we started going down down down. This month the batch that we're at is now the families that owe 3500, so that's the highest, all the other ones above it are already lined up for court. So next month what we're actually going to switch over is to the folks who defaulted in those repayments, now they're going to -- because they're going to have the higher amounts again, and they're going to go back up.

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: How many of
2	these families have we not talked to still?
3	MR. MERCHAND: When you say "not talked
4	to."
5	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: No comment
6	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: No communication,
7	no contact, no agreement, no nothing.
8	MR. MERCHAND: No, there's still we
9	only have but 169 repayment agreements, and we have
10	400 families that are outstanding, and only the
11	people that do not have a repayment agreement really
12	show up in that outstanding.
13	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So 231
14	people families have not been in contact with
15	you?
16	MR. MERCHAND: No, they have not come
17	in to do a repayment agreement or they have not come
18	in to recertify.
19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: We've
20	contacted them.
21	MR. MERCHAND: We've contacted them and
22	they've been getting their notices to cease every
23	month, we have so they're getting served. When
2 4	their number comes, when they reach that, we'll have
25	ten months of they got their letters every month.

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Because what
2	I'm trying to get at is, of those 231 families, they
3	need to understand what you just said about
4	MR. MERCHAND: Uh-huh.
5	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: if you make
6	the agreement with us, you get up to ten years. If
7	you don't and it goes to court, you're going to be
8	out of here in two years. Right? And they don't
9	probably know that.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Or less,
11	right.
12	MR. MERCHAND: So they're like,
13	housing, housing is not going to
14	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: They're going to
15	be if they agree in court to a repayment
16	agreement, it will be probably two years worth of a
17	repayment agreement.
18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Right.
19	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: They could be
20	evicted much quicker than two years.
21	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Oh, really?
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Sure.
23	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: It could be months
2 4	from the moment they first
2.5	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: If they don't

1	make	 okay
2		

MR. MERCHAND: You know, just to think about a family that owes 15,000, right? If we were dividing that over 12 years, the monthly payment was low, and they defaulted on that. Now they're going to take \$15,000 divided by 24, they're never going to make that payment. I don't want people to have to get to that point. It's almost insurmountable, unless they go in and do, then, a loan or something to kind of like pay that off or, you know, I think that those first families — and there's always got to be someone.

(Simultaneous crosstalk.)

I don't know if Margie is still here, but, like, I know that as we're doing all these things, there's always going to be the first batch, right? So those first ten families are our first batch, right? And they're — they could easily say well, no one's been to court in two years. But we have to start somewhere. Unfortunately, everything starts somewhere. We are at that point right now.

 $\hbox{COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO:} \quad \hbox{I know.} \quad \hbox{And} \\ \hbox{just trying to help as much as we can.} \quad \hbox{Is there a} \\ \hbox{way we can knock on a door or } --$

25 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: We do.

Τ	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I know
2	we're sending the letters.
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah.
4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: We're knocking
5	on doors.
6	MR. MERCHAND: The whole thing is that
7	we're begging them in every possible way to come.
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: We're
9	calling them.
10	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So people are
11	just not home?
12	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
13	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: They don't
14	answer, they don't care. They don't come in when
15	you set up an appointment.
16	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah, so we're
17	doing everything we can.
18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I think we
19	are.
20	MR. MERCHAND: And I think it's a lot
21	of the folks that are in the first two batches might
22	not be there. So we are just going to recoup, I
23	believe, in the first grab, the first, let's say, 30
24	apartments, we might get at least 10 or 12 that
25	there's no one in there

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: You can't go
2	in
3	MR. MERCHAND: that they're not even
4	going to show up. We already secured them if we saw
5	that there's no activity, but we can't recoup it
6	until we go to court.
7	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So we do a
8	yearly inspection, right
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes.
10	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: of the
11	unit?
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes.
13	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So we've gone
14	in and we can see
15	MR. MERCHAND: Yeah, and we just did
16	REAC so and Jackie just did some door
17	inspections. So as we go through stuff, there's
18	always reasons or ways that we catch certain things.
19	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Got you,
20	thanks for your job.
21	MR. MERCHAND: Yeah.
22	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you, Frank,
23	good job.
24	Our maintenance folks, we're doing a
25	special door painting at Adams and Monroe, Adams is

1 complete and we're starting here at Monroe. We're 2 doing pricing for various pavement repairs at our 3 parking lots. 4 Manny, we're going to get that -- we're 5 going to get that parking lot, parking space of yours, I understand maybe you got a new parking 6 7 space, Manny? Yeah. But, yeah, so you don't have to get wet when you come out of your car. But 8 9 anyway, we're taking care of your parking spot. 10 VOICE: Yeah, I heard about it. 11 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Good. 12 VOICE: Yeah, but there's one thing I 13 was telling you, is you put, like, a ramp there that 14 I can push my cart right, but do you know I can put 15 a --16 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, yeah, 17 we'll talk about that, we'll talk about that. But 18 yeah, we're going to take care of you there. We continue to work on -- on 19 20 November 8th we met with city representatives to 21 coordinate activities to improve trash collection, 22 recycling, including the effect it has on rodent 23 control. I think it was a very successful meeting,

yeah, let's talk about how we can more rat-proof our

trash operation and institute recycling at all of

24

25

our units. We have recycling in our elderly and disabled buildings, but not on our family right now. So we had a good meeting with them.

I did do attachments on our maintenance plumbing projects, our unit repair special projects. This time I included an extermination report that you can take a look at on all of the extermination activity, which is Attachment G. And our boiler report on what our boiler crews are doing on Attachment H. And it's getting cold, they're doing a great job out there.

A special note, a long-term and valued employee that many of you may know, Curtis Parker, is going to be retiring. So, Curtis. We're going to miss, as I say here, we wish him the best and we'll miss his uplifting spirit around the Housing Authority. So he's happy. Unfortunately.

HMA on finance, HMFA billing is pretty close to close-outs. Finance is working on year-end closing for last year's 2023 budgets. Housing Choice voucher budgets and contract management out of finance.

Like I said, Daniel could not be here with us this evening. In his report he did talk about Ray's Women's Self-Defense Workshop. We do

have a possibility for our boys and girls to do a

free basketball program with the Next Basket Wins

folks, so encourage your kids, grandkids to sign up.

This is great. Good stuff.

The food pantry continues, and we're rolling into our Thanksgiving celebrations, right? So that's coming up soon, as Thanksgiving comes upon us, the 15th, 16th, and 17th. And we've got a Christopher Columbus family Thanksgiving dinner coming up, and a senior Christmas celebrations coming up in -- we'll have another meeting before those, they're coming up. Christmas, I haven't finished my shopping yet.

On the 16th we'll have one Board meeting before this, but we are planning our winter wonderland celebration again over at the Arlette Braxton courtyard. So we're actively planning that right now.

We've got our food pantry, the library, and an affordable connectivity program. If anyone's not signed up for that, you get a discount on a month's service of \$30 for eligible households, and you should all be eligible.

And that is my report.

8	resident, it's a few residents there that are
9	there is a cockroach infestation, I guess, in one of
10	the apartments, but now it's leading into the
11	hallways.
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Of course it
13	would.
14	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: So they literally
15	have, like, poured acid in their hallways because
16	they don't want the roaches gets into their house.
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Sure.
18	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: So I think maybe we
19	should look into having an extermination of that
20	hallway.
21	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Of course.
22	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: But definitely that
23	unit.
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Where is it,
25	now?

1	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: It's in 655 6th
2	Street. I can provide you guys with more
3	information
4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: we'll
5	make sure we get out there this week
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: later off the
7	record.
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Thank you.
9	And we're chasing them. As you can tell from that
10	extermination report, it's a lot.
11	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes.
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: But we'll
13	definitely chase them as they come up. Thank you.
14	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes. Okay. So
15	that's it. I guess we can move on with the
16	resolutions. Can we please also
17	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Madam chair.
18	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Sure.
19	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I have questions
20	on the executive director.
21	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Sure, absolutely.
22	Before I let you speak, Commissioner Sanford, can we
23	also, Terry, make sure that the record reflects that
24	Commissioner Forbes has been on the meeting, because
25	he wasn't here when the roll call was made.

1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I don't
2	think Commissioner Sanford was here either.
3	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Oh, yes. And
4	Commissioner Sanford, my apologies.
5	Commissioner Sanford, the floor is
6	yours.
7	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Thank you.
8	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: You're welcome.

6	instructed and directed staff not to communicate
7	with Commissioner Sanford.
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I understand
9	your statement. But what we said at the last
10	meeting was give me a fresh e-mail with all the
11	information you'd like from me, and I've never seen
12	that e-mail this month.
13	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Commissioner,
14	could I ask a favor? Could we vote on business so
15	that residents who want to leave, because I know you
16	have a lot of questions, I saw you writing a lot
17	down, so just vote on business so that any residents
18	who want to hear any particular resolutions could
19	leave, and then you could kind of continue that.
20	And, again, totally up to you, I just want to be

1.4	keep minutes at the meeting, but I would be able to

16	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Well, if I may
17	recall, Commissioner Lewit, you're on the H4H?
18	COMMISSIONER LEWIT: Yes.
19	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay. We had
20	discussed at a prior Board meeting that Commissioner
21	Lewit would be taking minutes.
22	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I do remember

11	don't have them with me. I wasn't prepared to bring
12	anything with me.
13	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: And, again,
14	Commissioner Sanford, I'm going to ask you to keep
15	it specifically to his report, and, unfortunately,
16	that committee was not brought up in the report.
17	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: The Enterprise
18	team is mentioned in your report, is it not?
19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes, it is.
20	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay. What is
21	the contact information for the Enterprise team?
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I don't have
23	the contact information with me on the Enterprise
24	team. It wasn't asked for me in advance, but,
25	again, if you're referring to our HUD rep, Ellis, we

1	have offered to have a meeting with you, and I
2	understand
3	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I am not
4	referring to that.
5	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Okay.
6	That's
7	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
8	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I am referring
9	to the Enterprise Team.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: He's part of
11	the Enterprise Team.
12	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay. He's part
13	of the Enterprise. Who else is part
14	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I'll give
15	you what I can. Folks from the Enterprise Partners,
16	a number of folks from there, and folks from our
17	staff, and folks from HUD.
18	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Partners, from
19	Enterprise, HUD, okay. So we have talked at a great
20	length about Mr. Ellis's contact information.
21	Can you provide me with contact
22	information for the other individuals on the
23	Enterprise Partner team and the Enterprise HUD team?
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I can
25	probably give you company names. I'll ask them if

1	they have any issues with me releasing their
2	personal information.
3	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I'm not asking
4	for personal information. I'm asking for business
5	e-mail addresses.
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, I will
7	say what I can do.
8	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: That's not
9	personal.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I will see
11	what I can do.
12	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay. When you
13	say you see what you can do, when do you think you
14	can get back to me?
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Well, first
16	of all, I'd like to the request in writing from you.
17	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: You want the
18	request
19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Because we
20	had yes I do. We've asked for that many, many
21	times, and you don't seem to want to provide that,
22	so please do business, if you want something.
23	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Don't
24	mischaracterize my actions.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I'm not

1	mischaracterizing your actions.
2	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: You are.
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: No, I'm not.
4	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. This is going
5	to become a back and forth, maybe then you should be
6	put everything in writing, and you can feel free to
7	CC me or Mr. Fitzpatrick so we can make sure that
8	the information gets to you, but we will not have
9	the back and forth.
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Well, this is
11	the discussion.
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: No, I get it, but it
13	doesn't look very professional when you're sitting
14	here arguing with the director.
15	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I'm not arguing
16	with the director. My tone is not
17	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: So I'm the only one
18	that's misconstruing that the conversation
19	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So moving on.
20	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
21	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay, can we move
22	on, please?
23	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Moving on, Item
24	4 of your director's report under Housing for
25	Hoboken is the legal representative firm. Is that

1	correct?
2	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I'm sorry, I
3	don't know where you are, what you're talking about.
4	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Sure. So
5	page 2, Housing for Hoboken, Item 4, the legal
6	representative firm that we have chosen has agreed
7	to contract
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes.
9	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: and we'll
10	start our work with them shortly in preparation
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes.
12	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: for the
13	develop RFP.
14	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes.
15	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: What is the name
16	of that firm?
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Remind me,
18	Harold. I'm drawing a blank.
19	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Harold, can you
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Reno and
21	Cavanaugh.
22	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Yeah, this is
23	a resolution that was approved by the Board of
24	Commissioners.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah.

1	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: That I
2	believe, although you didn't vote for it,
3	Commissioner, you were present at that meeting, the
4	name of the firm is Reno and Cavanaugh.
5	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Thank you. I
6	wanted to make sure because it just wasn't clear in
7	the Director's report.
8	So that's Reno and Cavanaugh with a K?
9	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: No, with a C.
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: With a C. Got
11	it.
12	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: If you look
13	back in your meeting packages, you'll find it.
14	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: All right. Now,
15	who is our primary contact at Reno and Cavanaugh,
16	Director or Counsel?
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I don't have
18	that with me. I'm sorry.
19	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay. Harold,
20	would you know?
21	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: No, I think
22	the question is whether or not the contact between
23	the Authority and Reno and Cavanaugh on behalf of
24	the Authority was the Executive Director or the
25	counsel.

1	Do I understand the question correctly,
2	Commissioner?
3	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Allow me to
4	rephrase.
5	So we have our Housing Authority, and
6	then there's someone at, presumably, at Reno and
7	Cavanaugh who was working with the Housing
8	Authority, who is the primary person that we are
9	working with at that law firm?
10	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: You mean the lawyer
11	that's
12	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Is it Reno or is
13	it Cavanaugh?
14	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Yeah, it's
15	neither of the above. It's a fairly large firm.
16	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Right.
17	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: There are two
18	people who show up in their proposal as the primary
19	contacts, and I believe
20	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay.
21	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: the one
22	person is the person whose signatory was on the
23	contract.
24	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: All right. So
25	can you give me the names of those two people?

1	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, again,
2	I think the Executive Director is asking you to put
3	that in writing, and I'm sure he can get you the
4	information.
5	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I have to put
6	that in writing? You just can't tell me over the
7	phone?
8	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: They don't have it
9	in front of them. They didn't know these questions
10	were going to be asked.
11	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: It's not my
12	problem if they're unprepared.
13	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Well, they're
14	unprepared because they should bring in everything
15	from every single meeting that we have? We have
16	over ten meetings a month and you only participate
17	in one. Let's be real.
18	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Yeah, and I have
19	to read everything that they prepared.
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Well, we all
21	do.
22	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: They all do.
23	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: You don't have
24	that information, Harold? Is that what you're
25	saying, and I have to put that in writing?

1	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I can get it
2	for you, but the fact of the matter is you have it
3	too because it's in your previous meeting packages.
4	I wasn't prepared to talk about it right now. It's
5	certainly not an issue of not being prepared in
6	general. I think that that would apply to you as
7	well, Commissioner, in terms of asking questions
8	that you already know the answer to because you have
9	it in your meeting package.
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: No problem. So
11	my
12	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: They were
13	hired months ago.
14	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Some might say
15	knowing the answer to a question is being well
16	prepared.
17	Number six. Number six. Our
18	redevelopment team continued this is from your
19	report, Director, our redevelopment team continues
20	to meet regularly with the Enterprise Partners,
21	Harold Fitzpatrick, HHA staff, and HUD
22	representative represented by Mr. Wilson-Henri. I
23	asked about this earlier, and I've sent many e-mails
24	in writing ahead of this meeting, what is Mr.
25	Wilson-Henri's work contact e-mail at HUD?

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1	So, Director
2	(Audience interruption at this time.)
3	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Guys, please,
4	please. Guys.
5	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Chair, can you
6	control the room, please?
7	Director
8	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: I will, but you have
9	taken it and made a circus of this meeting every
10	month.
11	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. Guys, please,
13	please, please, and what I would say to you
14	residents, and I'm telling you as a resident, you
15	guys have a problem with this, then you need to go
16	to the person that put him on this Board, it's the
17	Mayor. Go to him and tell them and tell them what
18	we go through every month at this meeting, I'm sick
19	of it. I'm absolutely sick of it. Thank you.
20	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Are you done,
21	Chair
22	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Can you continue?
23	I'm done. I'm done. Yes, I am. I'm done.
24	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Are you back
25	under control?

Τ	CHAIRWOMAN REIES: 1es, 1 am. very
2	much so.
3	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So, allow me to
4	help you to understand. I have never
5	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Excuse me, guys, I'm
6	going to ask you guys to refrain from talking in the
7	gallery and let them speak so we can get this over
8	with, because I have kids I need to get home to.
9	Thank you.
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Director, I have
11	never asked you to set up a meeting between me and
12	Mr. Wilson-Henri. I have consistently asked you for
13	his contact information.
14	COURT STENOGRAPHER: Could you just
15	speak into the microphone, Mr. Sanford?
16	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I have
17	consistently asked for Mr. Ellis's HUD work e-mail,
18	that's it, that's all I want at this point, I do not
19	want to have a meeting anymore. If I have a meeting
20	with Mr. Wilson-Henri, it will be through a
21	communication between myself as a Commissioner and
22	Mr. Wilson-Henri as the HUD representative, and I'm
23	trying to understand why this Commissioner cannot
24	talk to the HUD representative.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: And, again,

1	I know I've communicated this with you. I went to
2	Mr. Ellis Wilson Henri and I told him of your wish,
3	and he told me that he did not want me to share his
4	information, and that he would be glad to set up a
5	meeting with you, but that is where I am. I am
6	going to honor his request to me. That is the long
7	and short of it and I Commissioner, I've told you
8	this. I don't know why you still don't understand
9	this. I don't know how I can how can I say it
10	differently to you to make you understand that this
11	man who is from HUD has asked me not to give out his
12	contact information, but that he'd be glad to have a
13	meeting with you if we set it up. That's
14	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay. Next
15	question.
16	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah.
17	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Next question.
18	Who is Mr. Wilson Henri's direct superior at HUD?
19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I do not
20	know. I don't know.
21	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: I think all this
22	information could be found on the HUD website. I
23	think it's just common knowledge, so I think maybe
24	you should do a little research on that aspect of it
25	and maybe you'll find out all that information. I

1	mean, if it's so needed and it's so because we go
2	over this question month after month, and the
3	Director continues to state the same thing, has not
4	changed what he has said, and I don't know if you
5	put it in writing to him, if so again, at this
6	point I just don't even know. It's useless. It's a
7	waste of time. We go through this every month.
8	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: You guys could
9	easily not go through this every month if I just got
10	the information that I've requested.
11	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Well, if I'm asking
12	for information month after month and I'm not
13	getting it, them I'm going to do my due diligence
1 4	and my due research to gather that information
15	without getting it from the person that's not giving
16	it to me, or that has been asked not to give it to
17	me. I'm just saying, it's just common sense.
18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, yeah.
19	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay, okay,
20	so
21	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I just Googled it
22	and found it, so
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, the
2 4	Director of HUD's information is the Secretary of
25	HUD.

1	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: It's common sense.
2	It's just a waste of time, but go ahead.
3	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So much for not
4	having a back and forth. I'm just asking questions.
5	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Uh-huh. The same
6	questions every month that you're getting the same
7	answers for.
8	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Yeah.
9	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay.
10	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I'm just trying to
11	help you. You could just Google it.
12	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: You're not
13	helping.
1.4	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: You got it right
15	on you, your phone has Google, right?
16	VOICE: Google works.
17	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Can we move forward?
18	Do you have any further questions?
19	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I do have
20	further questions. I am reviewing my notes.
21	VOICE: You should have been prepared.
22	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: You know, I'm
23	going to address that and I would love to be
24	prepared, but a lot of this information was only
25	provided to me today. It would be beneficial

1	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Adrienne, please. I
2	must ask you to refrain from
3	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
4	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: if the agenda
5	of your Board meeting packet was not handed out at
6	the meetings, and it would be beneficial if this
7	Commissioner doesn't have to request multiple times
8	to have the meeting agenda and the list of
9	resolutions.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: You got my
11	Director's report last night at 8 o'clock.
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: That was the only
13	thing that was provided yesterday, but everything
14	else was provided prior to that. The packet was
15	provided earlier in the week.
16	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah.
17	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yeah, just for the
18	record.
19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: The draft
20	packet.
21	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I've got the
22	package provided earlier today around 10 o'clock in
23	the morning.
2 4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: The draft
2.5	packet was last week, and then the final was this

1	morning.
2	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Check your
3	e-mail.
4	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So the H4H
5	meeting that occurred with the Hoboken public
6	schools
7	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: We're back on
8	three?
9	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Yes.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yes, yes.
11	I'm listening.
12	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I would like the
13	meeting minutes and the attendees of that meeting.
14	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, I
15	believe I can get you the attendees. We do not I
16	think I said earlier we do not take minutes of that
17	meeting. Now, actually no, we will produce
18	minutes of that meeting. I'm sorry. I misspoke.
19	Yeah, we can get minutes of that meeting when
20	they're published. Yeah, we do do minutes of that
21	meeting.
22	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: When do you
23	expect that to be published?
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: In the next
25	week or so.

1	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay.
2	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, no,
3	Executive Director, because it's just like the
4	Housing Authority. The minutes are prepared,
5	approved by the Board, and then available for
6	distribution if someone makes a written request
7	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah.
8	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: at the
9	next or after the next meeting of the Board of
10	Housing for Hoboken
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Right.
12	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: which
13	won't occur until the 28th of November.
14	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Right. And
15	they will approve that
16	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: And I know
17	that right, I know that schedule intimately
18	because Kevin Fitzpatrick of our firm is the one who
19	is actually the scribner of the minutes.
20	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Absolutely. That's
21	correct.
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Thank you,
23	Harold.
24	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you, Harold.
25	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: My last item, as

2	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Resolution
3	No. 2023-11.01, resolution of the Hoboken Housing
4	Authority, City of Hoboken, to approve the meeting
5	minutes for October 12, 2023, regular Board meeting.
6	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Motion.
7	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Second.
8	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Questions?
9	Concerns? Director, can you please call
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Wait, I do have
11	questions.
12	So during the overall discussion of the
13	meeting and I brought up that I still do not believe
14	that that the last meeting was called in
15	attendance with the Open Public Meetings Act. I'm
16	not here to debate that, but I would like that
17	reflected in the minutes because the minutes say
18	or say there being no further questions, comments,
19	or discussion, that's not true, there was quite a
20	bit of comment and discussion from this
21	Commissioner.
22	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. Terry, can
23	you please make sure that that's reflected in the
24	minutes? Thank you.
25	Any further questions or concerns?

1	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: One last item.
2	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes,
3	Mr. Fitzpatrick.
4	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: No, that's
5	all right, Commissioner, go ahead.
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay.
7	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: One last thing.
8	Toward the end of the written minutes it says there
9	is a closed session to discuss personal matters,
10	that should be changed to "personnel."
11	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: That's what
12	we're supposed to
13	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yeah, I think
14	yeah, that's true.
15	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: That's the one
16	that was
17	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Correct. So during
18	the last meeting there was a closed session. It was
19	requested by Commissioner Sanford to go into closed
20	session. After going into closed session, we all
21	felt that that really was not necessary to go into
22	closed session.
23	And, Mr. Fitzpatrick, am I right in
24	saying that we would like to reflect that that
25	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Yes, well,

I've recommended to the Executive Director that that
was not, and as we ultimately determined during the
discussion, Matthew Fitzpatrick stated at the time,
an appropriate closed session discussion. There is
a transcript of that closed session discussion,
which is available only in the closed session
fashion that is ordinarily the case when we have a
closed session. But in this case my recommendation
is that at the December meeting of the Authority,
the Authority adopt the resolution to determine that
since that closed session is no longer something
that needs to be kept in confidence, it be turned
into a public session and that the transcript of
that portion of the meeting be made available. And
I will, unless someone in Authority tells me not to,
prepare a resolution for next month's meeting
reflecting that.
We do keep things in closed session if
it's appropriate to keep them in closed session and
to keep the transcript confidential, and that could

happen for quite some time. In this case, that really was not appropriate and it should be fixed.

> CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Right, so --COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Harold, I have

some questions on this.

1	So are you communicating to me that it
2	is your recommendation that the word "personal,"
3	P-E-R-S-O-N-A-L, is the correct word
4	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: No, I'm not
5	talking about that at all. That's a typo.
6	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: That's a typo.
7	That's all I'm saying.
8	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I mean,
9	you're drifting off you're drifting off into some
10	sort of never land Commissioner. I'm talking about
11	the fact that at the next meeting, and it's not you
12	I'm talking to, I'm talking to the entire Board and
13	the staff, that there should be a resolution
14	releasing that transcript to the public. That's all
15	I'm saying. It was very clear.
16	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay, Harold.
17	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you, Harold.
18	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I need to
19	address you because that statement of yours of going
20	off into Neverland is unprofessional and uncalled
21	for. I just
22	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: It's
23	ridiculous for you to tell me that the spelling is
24	what I commented on. Everybody in the room
25	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: No, I just asked

1	about the spelling
2	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
3	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: knows
4	that's not what I was commenting on. So don't tell
5	me I'm unprofessional. You're being silly.
6	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
7	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I just asked
8	about the spelling. I said it should go from
9	"personal" to "personnel"
10	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: I think we should
11	look at ourselves before we actually speak to
12	someone else about unprofessionalism and so forth
13	because I think you more than any other Commissioner
14	here has been very unprofessional, not only to your
15	peers, but to the Executive Director and the staff
16	of this Housing Authority.
17	So can we move forward, please? Thank
18	you, Harold.
19	If you can please have
20	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: All I want is
21	this to be changed from "personal" to "personnel"
22	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: If you can please
23	have that resolution for December, I'd greatly
24	appreciate it. Thank you.
25	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: No, wait wait

1	walt. All I want is this word "personal" to be
2	changed.
3	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: And it will. It
4	will reflect it. It was an error. We're human.
5	Everyone makes a mistake.
6	So can you please, Director, make sure
7	that it's changed from "personal" to "personnel."
8	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Thank you.
9	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you very much.
10	I appreciate it.
11	COURT STENOGRAPHER: This is the Court
12	Reporter. Could you give me a page and line because
13	I can see in literally two minutes if it should be
14	"personal" or "personnel." If somebody said
15	"personnel"
16	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, let me
17	clarify. I believe we're talking about the minutes
18	that were prepared by the Authority which are about
19	to be voted on.
20	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Correct.
21	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I do not
22	believe we're talking about your transcript, Terry.
23	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes, it's not yours,
24	Terry. It's not the transcript of the meeting, it's
25	actually the minutes that are prepared by the

Τ	Housing Authority for the Commissioners.
2	COURT STENOGRAPHER: Oh, okay. I'm
3	sorry. I was going to say if you give me two
4	minutes I can check it. So thank you. Sorry about
5	that.
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you, Terry.
7	No problem.
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: In order to
9	make this change, do we need to table the minutes,
10	Harold, and vote on them after the change?
11	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: No, I don't
12	believe so. I don't believe so. I mean, this is a
13	ministerial nuance.
14	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: It's human error.
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah yeah.
16	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: We'll just
17	fix it in the final version.
18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah. And

11	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah.
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I'm sorry.

14	reason why you didn't was there a reason why you
15	didn't?
16	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Because
17	we're focused on Commissioners. I mean, we
18	thought we didn't remember your statement from
19	the last Board meeting.
20	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Gotcha.
21	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: And we
22	talked about several times
23	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So you're
24	going to get that.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, we'll

1	get that to you.
2	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Just e-mail it
3	out.
4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: We'll get
5	that totaled.
6	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Appreciate it.
7	The only other comment, you know, the
8	only other comment is, is there, like, a meal
9	allowance?
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: The way
11	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: or how does
12	that work?
13	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: The way
14	yeah, the way we're set up is a reimbursement. So
15	we get the actual the receipt for the meal, and
16	then we reimburse, or here, it's put on a Housing
17	Authority card in this instance.
18	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Right.
19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: We had at
20	one point, I hear, in our organization a \$50 per
21	diem, but that has not been in effect for years.
22	And we actually discussed that with the staff. The
23	problem I have with that is if you go to a place
24	like DC, it's really hard to eat for 50 bucks for
25	the day.

1	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: But we did that
2	in New Orleans. We stayed under 50.
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah.
4	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: We did.
5	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Matter of fact, if
6	you look
7	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: No, I was fine.
8	I was there. I know I didn't go over 50. Sometimes
9	I tried
10	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So it's \$50 a
11	day to eat and you can
12	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Yeah.
13	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So, like, if
14	you have one meal, like I see on here, McCormick and
15	Schmick's, Richmond?
16	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, that's
17	Corinne, yeah.
18	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So she spent
19	\$50 on that meal.
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah, and
21	we've got the receipts for that.
22	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: All right. So
23	then the rest of that day
24	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Whatever she
25	purchased, she probably purchased out of pocket.

1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: She may have
2	purchased out of pocket. Again, there's nothing to
3	say she couldn't have been reimbursed for that. She
4	just put in for that day
5	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: For food.
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: for that
7	amount, yes, for food.
8	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Right. So I
9	see on oh, it's October.
10	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: We don't get the
11	facts on how much we can
12	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
13	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: What's the
14	okay.
15	All right. Yeah, if I can I mean,
16	we're starting do we have any more conferences
17	left for this year?
18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah. I'm
19	in the New Jersey League of Municipalities in
20	Atlantic City next week, and that's also combined
21	with the NJNAHRO housing conference, and that's it
22	for the year, I believe.
23	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Isn't there a
24	San Diego one?
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: That's

1	coming up next year. That's next year.
2	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
3	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: That's
4	January.
5	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah.
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Is anyone going to
7	the municipalities other than you?
8	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I'm going.
9	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: We can
10	potentially be
11	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
12	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: We're at,
13	like, 12,000 now for the Commissioners plus yours,
14	yours is going to be up there, right, because you go
15	to every one.
16	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah,
17	uh-huh.
18	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: We might
19	topple like 40, 40,000 bucks?
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: It's
21	possible.
22	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And what was
23	the budget for?
2 4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Emil, what
25	was our budget? I don't remember what we put in.

1	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: I think it was,
2	like, 35
3	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Emil, we can't hear
4	you. I know you got off mute.
5	MR. KOTHERITHARA: We have a travel and
6	training budget of \$35,000.
7	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Won't we go over?
8	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Okay. And do
9	we have a budget for painting for the interior
10	buildings?
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: No.
12	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: There's no
13	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: There's no
14	specific budget for painting of interior buildings.
15	That's included in our maintenance budget.
16	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And the reason
17	why we haven't painted the buildings internally is
18	because we obviously, we don't have any money.
19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: We're
20	running like crazy just to keep up with our leaking
21	ceilings, our leaking pipes, and all of that. So if
22	there's time, for example, I mentioned earlier we're
23	painting the doors at Adams and Monroe now. So we
24	found a way to get a couple of maintenance guys and
25	we're paying we're going through and painting the

Τ	doors.
2	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah. See, my
3	thing is, and we'll get this at the end when all the
4	money is tallied, but if I were to poll the
5	residents of the Housing Authority
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Uh-huh.
7	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: and said,
8	okay, you have \$40,000, would you rather see all the
9	buildings painted, which haven't been painted in a
10	while, right, or would you rather have our
11	Commissioners travel to all of these cities? You
12	see what I'm saying? And that's where I'm hoping
13	that
14	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I do, but I,
15	again, fundamentally
16	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And I, you
17	know
18	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: disagree,
19	because it will cost pretty close to a million
20	dollars to paint all of our stairwells.
21	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: A million
22	dollars?
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Yeah. I
24	mean, you got to go in and do prep work. You got to
25	fix what's broken. You got to do all of that. We

have a price on that. We actually bid it out at one point maybe four years ago, so we had a price on that.

But I will make this other point, that I believe strongly that it's penny wise and pound foolish to not train. If you don't train, you wind up in a position of a housing authority that's a troubled housing authority, like this housing authority has been. I see it as one of the main reasons this housing authority has failed over the years, is if you don't do training of Commissioners and staff and know what's going on in our business, know what the best practices are, know what you should be doing, know what HUD's going to be doing next year, that you fail. It's crucial that staff -- and, I believe, Commissioners -- be trained to be a successful housing authority.

We're going to go into a huge redevelopment project, and if I don't -- and if we don't go and shake hands with the housing finance agency people, with the people that are from Washington, D.C., that are giving us these approvals, that we see, we shake their hand, we say hello, this is what we're doing, then we're not going to be successful. And I just believe training

_	is absolutely clucial. That think to compare it to
2	should we not do any travel but we could paint one
3	hallway is a false comparison. That's
4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah, I
5	understand. We'll agree to disagree. We're not
6	going to, you know. I just think that the reason
7	for past directors and leading us into troubled
8	status is based on the decisions and actions that
9	they went through. I don't know if those directors
10	went to, like, all the training, we would have been
11	in a different spot.
12	The second point is the training that
13	our Commissioners are getting at these conferences I
1 4	don't think are impacting our day-to-day activities
15	to the point that the money is being spent and,
16	again, we're going to disagree.
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I
18	understand, I understand.
19	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: It's on the
20	record, I'm just making those points, we can move
21	on. If you can send that report tomorrow, I'd
22	greatly appreciate it.
23	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: The only point
2 4	that I would make contrary to that, though,
25	Commissioner, is that it's not just the

1	Commissioners, it is
2	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: No, I get it.
3	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: the staff, it's
4	crucial that the staff is trained.
5	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I totally
6	think the staff is ideal, especially yourself,
7	but and, again, I made it from the beginning, if
8	the Commissioners want to go and they want to get
9	that extra training, then it should be on there own
10	dime. I just personally don't think the impact, the
11	money being spent for the Commissioners to go, the
12	value that we're getting back on a day-to-day
13	operational, strategic plan is not there. So that's
14	just my opinion, I know
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I
16	understand.
17	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: people
18	disagree. But I just wanted to put it out there.
19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Okay.
20	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you, Andrew.

14	all of us were very happy that we had come to such
15	success, I regard it as one of the best I've ever
16	seen. At the meeting, when it was being discussed
17	before it was voted on, Commissioner Impastato
18	pointed out that he thought there should be an
19	incorporation of the people who are on the special
20	review committee for the developer selection, which
21	is provided for in an amendment that the Authority
22	had adopted in February of 2023, to reflect that
23	those individuals would be covered by the ethics
24	rules of the procurement policy, and everybody
25	thought that was a good point and we agreed to

2 reflect that. And that is the provision to 3 see in the amended version on page 27, whe	hat you
3 see in the amended version on page 27, whe	
	ere it says
4 that those members of that committee would	l be
5 covered by Section 9 of the main body of t	he
6 procurement policy.	
7 I believe, Commissioner Impas	stato, that
8 that reflects the concern that you raised	and
9 addresses it.

that a provision put into the resolution before it was actually adopted, but not part of what had originally been presented, was put in the wrong place. We have a provision about what has to be reviewed in a contract, and it includes a number of things, including a New Jersey political contribution form. Those documents in 17.12 on page 17 of the contract review process, the contract approval and review process, is where the change that was put forward from the floor really should be.

What was put forward was an indication that there, in addition to the New Jersey political contribution form, be information about federal political contributions. And assuming that the Authority is willing to undertake that additional responsibility, which is not a matter of law, it would be a matter of policy, that's fine, I have no comment about that.

But to have put it in the ethics provision, I think, is an inappropriate placing.

It's not so much an ethics provision as it is a contract review provision. And, obviously, the existing provisions already had a bunch of things to be reviewed, including the New Jersey political

1	contribution provision.
2	So before you tonight, also, on page 17
3	is an amendment to put the requirement that public
4	information or a form, there is no federal form for
5	it, by the way, and it's not easily searchable
6	because it's done by candidate, not by contributor,
7	and the Authority will have to undertake to prepare
8	how they're going to do it, it should be moved to
9	17.12, where it would be a document that would be
10	reviewed with all other reviewed items when a bid or
11	approval is received.
12	COMMISSIONER FORBES: So
13	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: And then in
14	addition sorry?
15	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: No, Harold, I was
16	just going to ask for a clarification there. So
17	long and short of it is we originally put it in the
18	wrong place, you want to move it to the appropriate
19	place with the New Jersey provision, and we then
20	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Yes.
21	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: and then we
22	have to create the form because there's no current
23	form that exists in federal in that policy for
24	federal contributors. Is that
25	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: That's

1	correct.
2	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: is that kind of
3	the long and short of it?
4	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: That's the
5	short of it. Thank you for distilling lawyerism
6	into reality.
7	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: No problem.
8	(Laughter.)
9	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Thank you, Harold.
10	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Then the
11	only you're welcome. Thank you.
12	The only other thing is to do some
13	final edits in terms of pointing out that it was

20	different.

22	to help me to understand, what is the effect of
23	the of this policy on that committee?

5	entire section, Commissioner, that starts on page 4
6	and runs to page 5.
7	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Well, just can
8	you break it down to Commissioner Sanford's
9	point, is it will the people that are on that
10	committee have to disclose they'll have to
11	disclose where their financial
12	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: No, no. They will
13	have to disclose like any other vendor if, in fact,
14	they made a contribution to a federal candidate who
15	would be a congressman, a U.S. senator, president,
16	vice-president. That's what that's the only
17	provision
18	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, that
19	would apply to proposers. It wouldn't apply to the
20	members of this committee, Commissioner.
21	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: That's a
22	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I think we're
23	drifting from what the
24	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: The both things are
25	getting.

Ι	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: the policy
2	provides for. The policy essentially provides that
3	people who are operating on behalf of the Authority
4	in reviewing materials will do them ethically. The
5	idea of any kind of financial disclosure has nothing
6	whatsoever to do with anybody who sits on any group
7	or committee of the Authority other than the
8	publicly-appointed officials who are Commissioners,
9	where the state has created a requirement that those
10	individuals file a financial disclosure form, which
11	is something completely different from the question
12	of ethics in public contract and is provided for in
13	the local public in the procurement policy.
14	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay. So thank
15	you, Harold. That helps me to understand and face
16	this next question, which is when I was bringing
17	these subjects up, I would like the five to seven
18	members of the committee for evaluation of RFQs and
19	RFPs to file a financial disclosure form, that is
20	the objective of trying to
21	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, you may
22	like that, Commissioner, but that, you'd have to
23	talk to the legislature about that.
24	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So if I may

ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Legislature

is the one that creates financial disclosure forms as they're forms filed with the state, not the Authority.

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COMMISSIONER SANFORD: If I may finish, That was the discussion that we were Harold. having, at least that I was suggesting, that is the objective that I would like to have within this section. And just to clarify a little more with context, back in the summer of this year, I had also asked for this evaluation committee to be subject to some kind of -- some kind of disclosure rules, and you at the time -- and I don't want to put words in your mouth, Harold, but at the time I was left with the impression that because this procurement policy had already been adopted and already been established early in the year, that that was the time to do it. But now we have another opportunity to address it, and that's why I'm bringing it up again.

So with respect to the New Jersey state legislature, you know, we have the ability -- this is our procurement policy, we have the ability to make amendments to it, so how can this Housing Authority make an amendment so that these five to seven members are subject to a financial disclosure

1	form?
2	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, two
3	comments. One, what was actually done from the
4	floor is not what you just described.
5	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Exactly. That's
6	what I thought.
7	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Yeah, it was a
8	very long night.
9	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: And to that
10	extent, that just underscores, in my opinion,
11	further the fact that what was done from the floor
12	needs to be clarified.
13	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Yes.
14	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Secondly, if
15	you think that should be done, then I suggest that
16	you make a motion now to change what is being
17	presented to you to reflect what you need done, see
18	whether or not you get a second, and see whether or
19	not you get support.
20	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: All right.
21	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Can you
22	Commissioner, can you walk me through a hypothetical
23	because I'm trying to think about it in my head to
24	see if it is warranted, because I understand why you
25	would ask, like, one of those members, like,

Τ	potentially, what is the harm if they had a
2	financial interest or donation to, how would it
3	impact their decisions?
4	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Two different
5	things so I'm sorry to interrupt.
6	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: No no no.
7	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: But a financial
8	disclosure has nothing to do with your contribution
9	to an elected official. A financial disclosure has
10	everything to do with your personal finances, and
11	that becomes public. So, for example, as a
12	Councilperson, I have to disclose where I work, what
13	kind of money I make, what kind of real estate I
14	have, what kind of gifts I get. That is a very
15	personal financial disclosure.
16	In the State of New Jersey, we have
17	ELEC, which covers financial contributions to
18	elected officials.
19	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Right.
20	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: They're two very,
21	very different things.
22	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Right.
23	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I don't know
2 4	and I don't want to put words in the Commissioner's
25	mouth I don't know what he's trying to achieve.

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: That's what
2	I'm asking.
3	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Does he want to
4	know that Jane Doe who's on the committee makes
5	\$50,000 versus \$250,000, or does he want to know
6	does Jane Doe contribute to the U.S. Senate?
7	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: That's
8	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: That's the
9	question. I don't know what that
10	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Thank you for
11	explaining that. Commissioner, if you could, walk
12	us through a hypothetical where it would do harm to
13	that person's decision negatively against the
14	Housing Authority.
15	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Well, okay,
16	so
17	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: If you want
18	to
19	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Commissioner
20	Russo is correct. They're two entirely different
21	things. And as we've had this discussion with
22	Harold, the contributions, the political
23	contributions, that seems to be covered by the
24	ethics policy, so that so I am not talking about
25	the

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Got it.
2	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: contributions
3	with regards to this committee. So to clarify, it
4	is about a financial disclosure form.
5	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Okay.
6	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: The reasoning
7	for that financial disclosure form is that, just as
8	throughout all of the State of New Jersey, through
9	the City of Hoboken, through this Housing Authority,
10	it's not just public officials, it's whether
11	they're appointed or elected, it is also individuals
12	with that are key to very large decisions, and in
13	particular the reasoning is that this committee, the
14	special procurement committee or the committee for
15	evaluation of RFQs and RFPs, is going to be
16	selecting a very important vendor, which will be
17	assisting the Housing Authority with a project that
18	is at the moment calculated to be \$800 million.
19	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Right.
20	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Right? So
21	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Am I correct, before
22	you continue, am I correct in saying that they're
23	going to be picking it, but then they come to us for
24	a final vote?
25	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Correct.

1	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: So they're not
2	they're just going through them and then bringing
3	us
4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Offering a
5	suggestion.
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: the suggestion.
7	So they're suggesting, they're not bringing
8	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: You're
9	potentially saying they could be influenced
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Well, it's a
11	so, yes, it's
12	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: to make
13	that suggestion.
14	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: and it's a
15	very influential suggestion.
16	So my point is that all of us on this
17	Board and many officials, you know, the Director is
18	not a public official, he's not appointed, he's not
19	elected.
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: I file a
21	report every year.
22	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Yeah, you do,
23	you do.
24	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: That's not
25	true. For purposes of the New Jersey filing that is

1	required, he constitutes a public official.
2	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Oh, he does
3	constitute a public official. So Emil, as a CFO,
4	also constitutes a public official.
5	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: No.
6	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: No. Okay. But
7	he does file a financial disclosure, doesn't he?
8	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I'm not sure
9	which he you're talking about. If you're talking
10	about the Executive Director
11	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: He's speaking about
12	Emil.
13	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
14	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: he's
15	required by law to do so.
16	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: The CFO, the
17	CFO. Emil.
18	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: He is not
19	required.
20	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I'm just having
21	trouble understanding how you're equating to
22	someone's financial personal financial position
23	would influence their decision-making. For example,
24	if someone makes \$50,000 a year, has no real estate,
25	has no other holdings, has no investments, how that

1	person being on that committee would have, making
2	that decision, that there would be some kind of
3	concern there versus someone who's making \$2 million
4	a year, has multiple holdings, multiple investments,
5	multiple how are you I don't understand what
6	you're where you're going with that.
7	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: That's why I
8	asked for the hypothetical, but as I'm thinking
9	about it, a potential developer could gift one of
10	these members of the committee a speaking engagement
11	at a company for a \$100,000, and there could be a
12	bias there, potential, I mean, crazy hypothetical
13	but
14	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Sure, I get it.
15	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: And I don't
16	think by having them disclose it is a bad thing.
17	They don't ask for the money, it's just where you
18	work, what your real estate is in the State of New
19	Jersey
20	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Percentage
21	involved
22	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: have you
23	received any gifts, and so it's not that personal
24	where the person is, like, I have to put I make
25	\$25,000 a year. So I don't think it would

1	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I really don't
2	want to make things up. The financial disclosure,
3	I'm using the financial disclosure form that we all
4	have to fill out as a baseline. That's it. I mean,
5	it's at a very minimum that's what everybody on
6	this Board
7	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So you're
8	asking for that form to be filled out by every
9	member of the Committee.
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Of this
11	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Especially.
12	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: committee for
13	the evaluation of RFQs and RFPs because they've
14	already, for example, made an influential decision,
15	which is they have received the RFQs and they
16	qualified all of the vendors. They then sent
17	recommendations to this Board, and then this Board
18	acted upon that resolution to qualify the those
19	developers. So
20	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I'm just in
21	the an added step here and disclosing this, I
22	don't see as an issue, it's adding another layer to
23	protect ourselves. I'm almost a hundred percent
24	sure that none of these people have a conflict
25	well, I guess I wouldn't know.

1	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Like whether they
2	disclose it or not, if they're going to be crooked,
3	they're going to be crooked regardless.
4	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Again, I just want
5	to make sure everybody understands that this does
6	not determine any conflicts, it does not determine
7	anything like that, it's just a disclosure. That's
8	all it is.
9	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Yes.
10	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: So.
11	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah.
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: If that's
13	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: If we don't
1.4	know that a person, like the example I said
15	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Right.
16	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: developer
17	gave a gift as a speaking engagement to one of these
18	people for a \$100,000.
19	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Right.
20	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: We don't know
21	that right now.
22	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Right.
23	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: At least we're
2 4	asking them. If they're going to lie, they're going
25	to lie. But at least we're asking them

1	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: But what is that
2	disclosure form going to tell us because even if
3	they did, they're not disclosing that, are they?
4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah, gifts.
5	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: A gift
6	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Gifts for
7	speaking engagements
8	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
9	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: As Commissioner
10	Impastato said, it is just an added level of
11	protection, and it's not meant to drill down to any
12	specific personal person's situation, it's simply
13	applying the same standard of the that applies to
14	the Commissioners to this evaluation.
15	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Madam Chair?
16	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes.
17	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I do have one
18	point that I'd like to make about this. Certainly,
19	this is not under the New Jersey law, this is
20	something that you would craft yourself. And if
21	this were to be part of the policy, you have to
22	realize that it would apply to all of the members of
23	this special committee, including staff members of
24	the Authority who are not public officials.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Like

Ţ	volunteers.
2	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: And as
3	Commissioner Russo pointed out, the information
4	requested for a public official, which is probably
5	the price of being a public official, is information
6	that's quite invasive.
7	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: No, it's not.
8	I disagree.
9	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: No, wait a minute.
10	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: You don't
11	get it does not ask you for salary. It only asks
12	where do you where are you employed? Do you own
13	any real estate in New Jersey? You have to declare
14	those two things. There's no personal questions,
15	and that any gifts you received, speaking
16	engagements, travel gifts by anybody
17	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I'm looking at it
18	right now, it's gifts, reimbursements of expenses,
19	aggregate value exceeding \$400, it's addresses and
20	sources of any fees and honorariums, it's listing of
21	all addresses and business organizations and the
22	percentages that you own in those business or
23	organizations, it's asking you for all your
2 4	employment, and it's asking you for all your real

estate holdings.

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Right.
2	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: So and the
3	percentage of that real estate holding that you
4	have. So for someone who does not have a real
5	estate holding, does not get gifts, does not get
6	honorariums, it's you're right, it is not
7	invasive at all. However, if it is someone who does
8	get any of those things, if they receive that stuff
9	as their primary source of income, you are
10	disclosing all of your income, you are disclosing
11	all of your property, you are disclosing where all
12	that property is.
13	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Totally get
14	it.
15	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: So, again
16	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Then my
17	response to that is, just as we were Commissioners
18	and we made decisions to disclose that or not, if
19	you can't disclose that, then you shouldn't be on
20	the committee.
21	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: But why is that
22	fair?
23	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Let me
24	interrupt, Commissioner Impastato, I understand your
25	position, but the fact of the matter is that you

have to understand if you were to authorize this, it would apply to your staff members. I have no idea what your staff members' reaction would be to that. We struggled to find a committee that would be appropriate under this special circumstance. I think you'd be struggling further if people are asked to disclose that kind of information at a staff level.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: And on a volunteer level. I think this is adding a layer of bureaucracy to folks that don't make the final decision, they are doing a recommendation. And to ask ad hoc committees to go to that level of disclosure in their personal lives, I think, is going to be a real issue on pulling committees like this together.

COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I just think with the nature and the history of our Authority and the corruption that has occurred in and around our party, I don't think it's that crazy of an idea to just ask for a simple -- and maybe we change it, maybe we can tailor make it so that you just list certain things, or you don't need to put percentages. But just to declare that a gift wasn't given from a developer that we're going to pick I

1	don't see as a hard ask. I mean, I'm okay with if
2	we just go to a vote and just vote it up or down.
3	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Yeah, I'm ready
4	to make a motion, and I think Mr. Impastato
5	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Commissioner
6	Sanford, the floor is yours.
7	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Thank you. Just
8	one last question on this. So, again, I'm just
9	using the financial disclosure form that we fill out
10	as Commissioners as a reference point.
11	Harold, is there a
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Can you please keep
13	the conversations to a minimum? If you'd like to
14	have conversations, go outside.
15	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: As a compromise
16	so that it's not too invasive, is there any lesser
17	standard or lesser disclosure form that we could use
18	as a template?
19	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, I
20	happen to think that the provisions of Section 9
21	achieve that goal because it sets standards on what
22	people could have in terms of a relationship to
23	anybody that they would be voting on.
24	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So Section 9,
25	ethics in public contracting and public trust.

1	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Yeah.
2	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Oh, yeah,
3	yeah. I think that was the original thing that we
4	just added that.
5	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Yes, that was
6	the part
7	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah.
8	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Well.
9	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Now that I'm,
10	yeah
11	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: The whole
12	reason why I proposed that we do it this way is
13	because it was suggested that we extend the
14	application of the ethics provisions, and there was
15	this question about whether or not we used the term
16	"agent." I didn't like the word "agent" because I
17	thought that brought in a whole bunch of red
18	herrings. So what I'm doing is applying the ethics
19	provisions, and I think that's it's not a
20	compromise, I think it's a very good provision.
21	And I think that, as the Executive
22	Director said, a volunteer could live with that.
23	I'm not sure that many volunteers are going to live
24	with filing a form which at some point could become
25	public under OPRA.

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So, Harold, in
2	my example, my hypothetical, if a member of this
3	special committee was given a gift from one of the
4	developers for a speaking engagement or where it
5	created some type of conflict, they would have to
6	disclose it under this, right?
7	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, not
8	only that, I think if one of the developers were to
9	give a gift to a member of the committee, the member
10	of the committee shouldn't be on the committee.
11	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: We would kick
12	them off.
13	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: But yeah,
14	right, that's what I'm
15	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Except like when
16	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So how do
17	we how would that actually this these line
18	items make it clear that you have to disclose it.
19	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Uh-huh.
20	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Absolutely.
21	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Okay. As long
22	as
23	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: The developer
24	always has to disclose it.
25	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Right, I'm

1	just I'm more concerned with the yeah, but
2	I
3	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay.
4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I'm okay with
5	it.
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. So.
7	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I'd like to just
8	make the motion, and I hope Commissioner Impastato
9	still seconds it, to do the financial disclosure.
10	That is what I would like is the financial
11	disclosure form. So if you could help me out,
12	Harold, for I would like to make a motion to
13	amend the amendment to the procurement policy with
14	respect to selection of developers for HUD/RAD
15	repositioning, section committee for the evaluation
16	of RFQs and RFPs, that the members of that
17	evaluation committee are required to file a
18	financial disclosure form consistent with what the
19	Hoboken Housing Authority Commissioners file with
20	the State of New Jersey.
21	Would that be a fair statement for a
22	resolution?
23	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, I'm not
24	going to interpret your intention, but it sounds
25	like a resolution that could be considered.

1	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Ok	ay. So that
2	is my resolution.	
3	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO:	I'll second it
4	for a vote.	
5	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay.	
6	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Th	ank you,
7	Commissioner.	
8	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Direct	or, could you
9	call the roll?

6	Resolution does not pass. Okay.
7	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Good process.
8	That was a good process, though.
9	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you.
10	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I thought that
11	was
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Absolutely.
13	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Everybody
14	that was good.
15	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. So we've had
16	already the synopsis of what this was, what the
17	policy was, we went over that. We just put the
18	motion on the floor. It didn't pass. Now can we
19	move forward with actually approving the amendments
20	to the procurement policy that's in front of us.
21	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So just one
22	two small things that I would like to make a motion
23	on, and because it's been such a good process so
24	far, I do I would not like I've always been
25	against the practice of piggybacking, and there are

1	Sections 21, cooperative purchasing, and Section 22,
2	otherwise known as piggybacking, and I would like a
3	motion to consider amending this policy to not allow
4	cooperative purchasing and not allow piggybacking.
5	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: So there's a motion
6	Is there a second? There's no second.
7	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay.
8	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: And you said that
9	there was one more thing?
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Those were the
11	two combined
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: That would be it?
13	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I combined
14	them together, just so we're out.
15	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you. So now
16	can he move forward with approving or
17	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Motion.

2	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. Resolution
3	No. 2023-11.05, a resolution of the Housing
4	Authority of the City of Hoboken to adopt a policy
5	on public discussion of closed session
6	deliberations.
7	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Motion.
8	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Second.
9	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Questions?
10	Concerns?
11	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Yes.
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Sure.
13	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Harold, could
14	you help us to understand the purpose of this
15	resolution?
16	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: The purpose
17	of this resolution is to address a vague area of New
18	Jersey law. Some people are under the impression
19	that discussion of closed session topics is some
20	actionable legal issue in and of itself, and in many
21	states that's true. We did a global, that would be
22	every state and various districts, search, and, for
23	example, in California it's a crime to talk about
24	closed session topics. That's not true in New
25	Jersey, however. There are cases in New Jersey that

reflect that some people, including judges, think that it is inappropriate, and there have been people who are sanctioned for having talked about something in closed session, including by judges. But it is a very spotty process.

What is accepted is that in general it's inappropriate to discuss closed session materials unless ultimately they would be released to the public. And what many places in New Jersey have found to deal with that is to establish a policy such as this, that as a matter of the Board policy, which could be sanctioned under certain circumstances by the Board, it's inappropriate to talk about closed session discussions unless the Board as a group decides at some point that that closed session is no longer subject to confidentiality and can be released to the public.

We haven't had a policy like that up till now, so in the past if someone did some discussion of that, it was something that was vague in terms of what was proprietary, what was public, whether or not it was appropriate to have happened, and what the remedy would be was not resolved. The purpose of this going forward, and only going forward prospectively, would be to state the policy

1	of the Authority so that it's clear if it were to
2	happen in the future.
3	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So in
4	understanding the resolution, it says whereas there
5	is no definitive law in the State of New Jersey on
6	this issue, and you just explained that you've done
7	an exhaustive research on this, are there any
8	housing authorities that have a policy like this in
9	New Jersey?
10	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I have no
11	idea.
12	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay.
13	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I have no
14	idea.
15	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So this
16	resolution is potentially uncharted territory.
17	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I don't agree
18	with that at all. There are plenty of circumstances
19	reported in New Jersey where situations like this
20	occurred. You asked me about housing authorities.
21	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Yeah, I'm
22	asking
23	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: But there
24	definitely are cases that went up several levels in
25	New Jersey on issues like this. And, quite frankly,

1	in most cases the way it gets resolved is that the
2	offending party apologizes.
3	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So is there a
4	policy out there that a public housing authority in
5	the State of New Jersey has adopted that this
6	housing authority can use as a template
7	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Okay, you've
8	now asked the same question you asked before, and
9	I've answered it before, but I'll give it to you one
10	more time. The answer is I have no idea.
11	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay. And the
12	only reason I'm asking the same question again
13	differently is because if we're going to adopt
14	policy, then why not adopt a policy that is
15	consistent with other housing authorities?
16	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Because maybe we
17	want to be a trailblazer, we want to start this
18	policy and maybe other housing authorities may
19	follow in suit. That's my opinion.
20	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Well, okay.
21	Then that would lead me to the next question, which
22	is why this policy is even needed.
23	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: It's just a
24	precautionary policy that we're taking, you know,
25	that we're doing it in the event that closed session

1	discussion is released in public. I think it's
2	important that we have something in place where we
3	can, you know
4	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Hold each other
5	accountable.
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: hold each other
7	accountable
8	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I'll just give you
9	an example from the Council side of things. There
10	were closed session that we've had in the City of
11	Hoboken, so something very close to home here,
12	right. Those closed session discussions wound up in
13	a news report, right, closed session materials,
14	letters, wound up in a news report, right. So
15	it's I think it's just a smart policy to make
16	sure that anything that we discuss in closed
17	session
18	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Is not released.
19	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: is released at
20	an appropriate time so that we don't put the Housing
21	Authority in a precarious situation, right. So, for
22	example, if there was a lawsuit, right, something as
23	simple as a trip and fall, right, we talk about a
24	potential settlement in that lawsuit for a trip and
25	fall, but the word gets out that that settlement

agreement we talked about \$50,000 versus \$500,000.
We don't want the person whose suing the city to
know that we had that discussion, right? Or, in
this case, the Housing Authority. So it's just a
precautionary thing, at least in my opinion.
COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Fair enough.
VOICE: You take action is the law, we
got to know if you take action in closed session.
That's the law.
CHAIRWOMAN REYES: And it becomes
public at a certain time. I think the lawyer the
lawyer stated that.
COMMISSIONER RUSSO: That's what
we're
VOICE: No, he said no. He just said
no.
ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: No, he said
that closed session when we have closed session,
that it does become public at a certain time.
VOICE: If you take action.
CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Correct, if we
take
ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, there
are some closed session discussions that can remain

1	VOICE: Right, because you didn't take
2	action.
3	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: There are
4	others that become public. I think what the comment
5	is, is that there are circumstances where after the
6	closed session the Authority comes out into open
7	session and adopts a resolution, and if that's the
8	case, the resolution is public. But the closed
9	session discussion is not necessarily public.
10	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I have a
11	question. It says here determination of Board to
12	issue an oral written or warning or reprimand and
13	could result in further I would like to see
14	COURT STENOGRAPHER: Sorry. I'm sorry,
15	Andrew, could you just restate that?
16	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah. So my
17	question is my question is I would like to be
18	more specific to the potential appropriate action.
19	I would like to see in there two things. One, it be
20	retroactive; and, two, potential I don't know
21	what the word is expulsion of the Board. Is that
22	possible?
23	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Not in my
24	opinion. The only person that has the right to
25	remove a member of the Housing Authority Board is

1	the so-called appointing authority of that
2	Commissioner, and it depends upon who made the
3	appointment as to who the review would be made by.
4	That's in the statute.
5	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Could we put a
6	recommendation to the appointing authority for
7	expulsion? Is that the right I don't know if
8	that's the right word. Or removal?
9	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: No. I
10	understand what you're saying. That would be up to,
11	again, an amendment to what you're being presented
12	with. But the answer, Commissioner Impastato, is
13	yes, you could propose that.
14	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So that's
15	and what about the retroactive? If it is proven
16	that
17	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I'm concerned
18	about retroactive. Retroactive laws are always
19	subject to significant challenge, and so would a
20	policy. For someone to try to argue that something
21	that's already occurred would be subject to a
22	resolution that's only being adopted now, I think
23	that would jeopardize the strength of this policy.
24	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah. My only
25	pushback would be that the actual action that they

1	did was already breaking the bylaws of the Board,
2	right? Or no, or are we saying that this is
3	like, as it stands right now
4	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: There is no
5	bylaw provision to address.
6	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Okay, okay.
7	So as it stands write now, you can discuss whatever
8	you want in closed session, it's just not
9	recommended. Is that correct?
10	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, I'm not
11	sure it could be whatever you want, there may be
12	things that you discuss which, independently of this
13	policy or other New Jersey law, might be
14	inappropriate.
15	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Okay. Got it.
16	So yeah, I would like to make the recommendation
17	that for recommendation of expulsion to the
18	appointing authority.
19	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I'll second that.
20	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Director, can you
21	call the vote?
22	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Okay. So let
23	me just get the language here. The last part of it
24	says could result in further recommendation for
25	appropriate action, I would propose to say which

1	could include referral to the appointing go
2	authority of any Commissioner.
3	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Say it again,
4	Harold.
5	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: I know
6	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
7	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Give me a
8	second to write the rest of it, and then I'll read
9	it all to you.
10	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Issue an oral or
11	written warning or reprimand and could result in
12	further recommendations for appropriate action,
13	including
14	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Which could
15	include reference to the appropriate appointing
16	authority for removal of the Commissioner.
17	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yes.
18	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. Perfect.
19	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Yup, good.
20	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: All right. So
21	that's the motion that's on the floor?
22	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Motion
23	seconded.
24	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, it
25	would be a motion to amend what has already been

Ţ	introduced. To introduce that additional language
2	recommended by Commissioner Impastato.
3	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: So we vote on
4	that, and then we go and vote on the new resolution.
5	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Correct.
6	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: If it passes.
7	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Yes.
8	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. So.
9	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: The amendment
10	first, Director.
11	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Correct. So this is
12	a vote for the amendment, as Harold read it out
13	loud.
14	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Are we
15	ready?
16	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes.
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Anthony
18	Forbes?
19	COMMISSIONER FORBES: Yes.
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Andrew
21	Impastato?
22	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yes.
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Aaron Lewit?
24	COMMISSIONER LEWIT: Yes.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Barbara

1	Reyes?
2	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes.
3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Michael
4	Russo?
5	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Aye.
6	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: James
7	Sanford?
8	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: No.
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Erica
10	Seitzman?
11	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Yes.
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. Now, can we
13	go back and vote on the resolution with the
14	amendment?
15	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Motion.
16	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Second.
17	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Well, I have
18	this discussion, I have a question now. Now that
19	this language has been added
20	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Uh-huh.
21	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: you know,
22	there's a lot of talk about violation, expulsion,
23	reprimand, removal.
24	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Uh-huh.
25	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: It seems to me

1	that if someone is going to be adversely affected
2	and possibly removed that a Rice notice would be
3	necessary.
4	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Absolutely
5	not. First of all, Rice doesn't apply anymore, that
6	case has been overruled for quite sometime. And the
7	Rice notice is only with respect to employment
8	situations, not Commissioners. The concept of Rice
9	has been reincorporated in a separate case, and all
10	it says is that if action is going to be taken,
11	there be a notice to the employee of what that is.
12	It doesn't apply to this at all.
13	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I would beg to
1 4	differ with you.
15	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, I'm the
1.6	lawver for the Authority I'm giving my opinion of

ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, I'm the lawyer for the Authority. I'm giving my opinion of that, and you can differ with me, but that's not going to change my opinion.

COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I'm not trying to change your opinion, Harold, but I am trying to share with you a different perspective, which is when I was removed from this Housing Authority Board, I did consult an attorney, and at that time I believe Rice was the applicable law, so we can address it without whatever Rice is, that --

1	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, what I
2	suggest is if you want to consult with an attorney,
3	Commissioner, you go take a look at
4	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
5	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Could I just
6	clarify something?
7	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Just to be
8	clear, and this is how I understand it, your term
9	ended, right?
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: That is not
11	correct. It went into holdover status and then I
12	was removed from the Board.
13	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I'm sorry
14	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I think you're
15	wrong. It was the Council, right?
16	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: That's not what
17	happened. What happened was there was a holdover
18	status, and then there was a different Commissioner
19	appointed by the City actually by the yeah, by
20	the City Council, it was by the City Council, and
21	then you were reappointed under the provision that
22	allows for the mayor's appointment to this Board.
23	So you were never removed by the City Council. You
24	were not reappointed because someone else was
25	reappointed in your place. So and, again, not that

1	it matters
2	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yeah.
3	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: you were here
4	or you weren't here
5	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Is that clear,
6	though, because
7	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
8	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I think it's
9	important to understand the differentiation between
10	the two.
11	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So without
12	getting too much into the weeds, I'm going to I
13	think we should agree to disagree on this point.
14	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Sure.
15	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I argue the
16	complete opposite, that I was removed by the Hoboken
17	City Council, and that's my position. You shared
18	your position. That is adjacent to this discussion
19	about going forward. If someone is going to be
20	removed from a Board, then I think when Harold was
21	talking about how Rice was supplanted, whatever the
22	process should be now, when an employee or a public
23	official is being told they have transgressed and
24	it's possible that you are going to be removed from
25	your employment or from your Board, what notice

1	needs to be sent to them?
2	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Not Rice.
3	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Commissioner,
4	just, again
5	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, it's
6	not I'm sorry, Commissioner, go ahead.
7	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: No thank you.
8	I think you just confused as to the understanding of
9	how Commissioners get appointed or, in fact,
10	removed. This Board, this Commission has no
11	authority to remove anyone who sits here as a
12	Commissioner. This is a policy that we're putting
13	in place on how we internally will handle someone
14	who is, in our opinion, violating that policy. We
15	can very much simply issue an oral reprimand, we can
16	very much do a written reprimand, we could just grab
17	you on the side one day and say, hey, Andrew, you
18	shouldn't have said that, right.
19	This is giving us the ability to use
20	this policy to make sure our Commissioners are not
21	putting the Housing Authority in jeopardy in any
22	way, shape, or form. This will never, can never
23	remove a Commissioner from this Board.
24	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Only the appointing
25	authority.

1	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: The appointing
2	authority, however, can do that. So I think I
3	think you're going down a rabbit hole where you
4	don't necessarily mean to because it's not this
5	Board that would ever remove one of us, it's the
6	appointing authority that would do that. This is
7	really more of an internal protection so that, like
8	I said, Commissioner Seitzman doesn't go outside and
9	say, oh, we're going to settle with Joe Schmoe for
10	\$50,000, and he gets wind of it, right?
11	Those are problems that occur not only
12	in authorities but other appointed boards, other
13	municipal councils, all kinds of different places,
14	right. So this is protecting our Authority to make
15	sure that we don't go down that road. And if
16	someone does go down that road, we now have a policy
17	in place to help them to understand that they did
18	something wrong and that we can grade that
19	reprimand, whether it's an oral, written warning, or
20	we recommend to the appointing authority that
21	someone should be removed from this Board. It
22	doesn't mean we do it, it means that authority will
23	do it.

24

25

COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I understand --

COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Or can.

1	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I understand
2	everything very clearly of what's going on. I have
3	been on
4	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: But the only
5	reason I said it that way is because you misspoke a
6	few times.
7	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I did not
8	misspeak.
9	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: You did.
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I spoke
11	intentionally.
12	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Yeah, you did.
13	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: We disagree on
14	the content.
15	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Yeah, listen,
16	you're entitled to your opinion, but you're not
17	entitled to facts. Facts are facts.
18	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Neither are you.
19	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Right, I know. My
20	facts are clear.
21	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: My point is
22	that my point is that this policy, as currently
23	envisioned, is somehow going to be going to
24	trigger an action that the appointing authority may
25	or may not do. Is that fair? Because why would you

1	issue a suggestion or a letter of reprimand or
2	suggestion for removal or expulsion to the
3	appointing authority, but then what does the
4	appointing authority do? There's no policy
5	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: They have the right
6	to remove the Commissioner.
7	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay. Well,
8	what is that right?
9	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, the
10	appointing authority has to follow the statute. You
11	might want to look at the statute, Commissioner.
12	It's very clear that the appointing authority has to
13	follow a statutory procedure.
14	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I do know the
15	statute.
16	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: This referral
17	would simply be something that could have them look
18	at the issue, but they have to address the issue.
19	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: But then
20	shouldn't this resolution
21	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: I still want
22	to go back. I appreciate Commissioner Russo's
23	explanation of the various differences here, and
24	that was what I was going to say, so thank you.
25	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: You're welcome.

Τ	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: But I still
2	want to go back and point out to you that the case
3	that you want to cite if you want to look at
4	something is Kean Federation of Teachers v. Ada
5	Morell, 233 N.J. 566, which was decided June 21st of
6	2018. It applies to employees under certain
7	circumstances, and it severely limits what
8	previously was called a Rice notice power in the
9	hands of an employee. But it has absolutely nothing
10	to do with a Commissioner.

COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay. Then from a perspective of liability, this policy could create a situation where an adverse act is taken against an individual, and it would thus expose the Housing Authority to liability, because yeah, anybody can come together and have an opinion that someone transgressed, but that's not necessarily based in fact. But what's being talked about isn't that's the opinion of the Housing Authority, so I don't think from a position of liability, you know, we should expose ourselves to that.

CHAIRWOMAN REYES: I think as

Chairwoman I think that's your opinion and that's

why you have a right to vote for the policy or not.

So --

1	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Or make a
2	motion to
3	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Or make a motion to
4	remove it. I don't know at this point what do we
5	want to do.
6	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I would ask I
7	would make a motion to table. I don't disagree
8	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. So there's a
9	motion on the floor to table this resolution. Do I
10	have a second? No, I don't.
11	Okay. So now could we move forward
12	with voting on the resolution as amended?
13	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Motion.
14	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Second.
15	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Well, I would
16	just like
17	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: I think
18	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I would just
19	like counsel to address my question about liability.
20	Is the Housing Authority creating liability?
21	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
22	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Well, the
23	Housing Authority has liability in everything it
24	does.
25	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you.

1	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: That's why it
2	has a counsel, that's why it follows very careful
3	procedures. There's as much liability, I would
4	offer, in the case of revealing confidential
5	information that was discussed in closed session as
6	there would be in this. The statute is very clear
7	on how an actual removal would occur. And I think
8	that statute, followed correctly by the appointing
9	authority, would extinguish any potential for
10	liability.
11	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So but with
12	establishing and following careful procedures, that
13	doesn't seem to be in the wording of this
14	resolution. Are we creating a are we creating a
15	groundwork or framework for counsel to create a
16	policy or is this paragraph
17	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: No, that's
18	the policy. I don't think it's vague at all, I
19	think it's very clear. And I think you're, again,
20	drifting into never-never land.
21	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Well, wait. An
22	inappropriate action, what is
23	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: I think if you
24	just don't talk about closed session dialogue, we're
25	good.

1	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yeah, I don't think
2	that we have to go through everything every single
3	word on this resolution. We have spent over 20
4	minutes on this resolution. We've basically gone
5	over every word that's on the policy. What else is
6	left?
7	Harold, is there anything else left?
8	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: There's no
9	definitive law
10	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
11	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: We can be held
12	liable, just like we can be held liable for anything
13	else. I don't think we've spent more time on a
14	resolution that really affects our residents as we
15	have on this. It's frustrating.
16	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: There's no
17	definitive law on this resolution. This is
18	completely
19	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: You plan on
20	violating the policy?
21	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: I am so confused.
22	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: That's not the
23	issue here.
24	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. So you have a
25	right, I think every question that you have asked

L	has been answered by our lawyer. It has been
2	answered by Councilman Russo, Commissioner Russo. I
3	think everyone has answered every one of your
1	questions. I don't know what else is left. I would
5	like for us to move forward with a vote at this
S	time.

Director?

COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Why are you frustrated? This has been a very informative conversation.

informative conversations for things that pertain to nothing that really affects our residents. It's frustrating. Maybe we should have spent more time on this, on the -- on our revitalization program or our redevelopment. Let's spend that time. Let's do that. Let's participate in committees. Let's do that so that we can show that we're really here for the residents. Let's do that. That's productive. That I don't mind sitting here for two hours and discussing and having the lawyer discuss and everybody else discuss.

But this? It's just nonsense. We went word for word on this policy. It's absolutely ridiculous. I will no longer discuss it.

1	Director, call the vote.
2	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: If it's
3	nonsense, then why have it?
4	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Because, you know
5	what, well, you know what? If it doesn't pass, they
6	don't want it, right? So everybody here has a vote.
7	Use your vote. If you don't want it, vote no. If
8	you want it, please vote yes. Thank you.
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Anthony
10	Forbes?
11	COMMISSIONER FORBES: Yes.
12	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Andrew
13	Impastato?
1 4	COMMISSIONER IMPASTATO: Yes.
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: Aaron Lewit?

3		ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK	: Yes.
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1	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Now, new business.
2	Can we move forward to new business?
3	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: So, under new
4	business, we mentioned, I'm just going to ask it
5	once because
6	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Absolutely.
7	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: which is
8	COURT STENOGRAPHER: Could you just
9	talk into the microphone, please?
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: One moment. So
11	under new business, we agreed to move this to new
12	business, I am asking the Director, when did you
13	direct HHA staff not to communicate with
14	Commissioner Sanford?
15	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RECKO: And I've
16	asked to you put that in writing.
17	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you.
18	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I can put it in
19	writing again. I've got one more item of new
20	business.
21	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Absolutely.
22	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: In our October
23	meeting, we had a resolution.
24	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Guys, can we please
25	keep it down in the audience?

1	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Resolution
2	No. 2023-10.05, a resolution excuse me, I'm going
3	to strike that, please.
4	Okay. A resolution of the Housing
5	Authority of the City of Hoboken to demonstrate
6	support of the authority for the Hoboken Housing
7	Authority redevelopment plan being considered for
8	final adoption by the City of Hoboken. Under that
9	resolution there was a memorandum of understanding.
10	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Uh-huh.
11	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: And under on
12	page 3 of 4, Section 6, termination, this MOU may be
13	terminated by mutual written agreement of the
14	parties upon 30 days' written notice. This MOU
15	shall automatically terminate upon completion of any
16	specific tasks within the scope of work as the term
17	is defined herein.
18	Based upon Section 6 of the memorandum
19	of understanding, I would like to make a motion to
20	terminate the motion terminate the memorandum of
21	understanding.
22	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Motion?
23	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Could I ask a
24	question?
25	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Yes.

1	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: I just want to
2	understand your motion, you're asking this Board to
3	terminate the MOU to stop the redevelopment of our
4	Authority?
5	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: No. The motion
6	is to simply terminate the memorandum of
7	understanding.
8	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Right. Which
9	would trigger no understanding with the City of
10	Hoboken, which would trigger no plan for the
11	redevelopment, which would trigger no ability to
12	move forward for an agreement for that redevelopment
13	plan, which would trigger no new housing for our
14	residents in the city of Hoboken.
15	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Exactly.
16	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Is that my
17	understanding?
18	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I simply believe
19	that the memorandum of understanding is not in the
20	best interests of the Housing Authority.
21	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Again, I'll ask
22	the same question now that you added a different
23	word in there, so you believe that redeveloping our
24	properties is not in the best interest of the
25	Authority?

1	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: No, that is not
2	what I believe.
3	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: But you want to
4	stop the process so that we can so that we cannot
5	redevelop our properties.
6	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I don't want to
7	stop the process.
8	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: But you want to
9	(Simultaneous crosstalk.)
10	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: I just want to
11	terminate this memorandum of understanding.
12	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Which is
13	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Which would
14	terminate all those other things.
15	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Exactly.
16	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: That's what I
17	would like, to stop the memorandum of understanding.
18	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. So would you
19	like to put that motion on the floor?
20	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Understood. I
21	just wanted to make sure I understood it correctly.
22	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Okay. So
23	Commissioner Sanford has a motion on the floor to
24	remove the memorandum of understanding from the
25	resolution that was adopted during the month of

1	October. I don't have the exact number, the
2	resolution number, but I believe he stated it. So
3	is there a second? He has a motion. Is there a
4	second? There's no second. So
5	COMMISSIONER SANFORD: Okay. That's
6	it. Thanks.
7	CHAIRWOMAN REYES: Thank you.
8	So motion to adjourn?
9	COMMISSIONER RUSSO: Motion.
10	COMMISSIONER SEITZMAN: Second.
11	ATTORNEY H. FITZPATRICK: Goodnight,
12	everyone.
